B'ham Ladies In Fund Drive

Otto F. Kraushaar, president of Goucher College, has announced that the college has realized a total of \$5,165,000 as a result of its 75th anniversary campaign.

Mrs. John W. Carter, 1174 Fawcett Road, Birmingham, has served as vice-chairman for the 75th anniversary fund in the state of Michigan.

Mrs. Richard Husta, 575 Townsend Street, Birmingham, has served as a worker for the 75th Anniversary Fund.

THE CAMPAIGN, which was begun in January of 1967, had as its goal \$5,075,000 to increase the endowment for faculty salaries and to construct several buildings needed to complete the Towson campus.

At the conclusion of the campaign, Goucher had received \$5,000,000 in gifts and pledges. Several tax-exempt life income trusts and a sizeable bequest add approximately \$160,000 to the funds so far received.

Edison Operations Chief Retires Aug. 1



William Williams

William W. Williams, widely-known utility engineer and manager of operations for The Detroit Edison company, will retire Aug. 1 after 39 years of service.

He and his wife, the former Priscilla Alden Briggs, will leave their present residence at 655 Hawthorne road, Birmingham, to live on their farm near Arlington, Vermont.

The Williams' have two daughters, Mrs. Chandler E. Swallow and Mrs. Gilbert A. Bogley; and a son, Gardner S. Williams.

IN HIS PRESENT position, held since 1952, Williams senior has had responsibility for the direction of nine operating departments including some 4,500 of the com-

pany's total of 10,000 employees.

Born in Detroit, Williams spent his early youth in Ann Arbor, where he received his engineering degree from the University of Michigan in 1921.

His studies were interrupted for service in France, during World War I, as an U. S. Army infantry captain.

In 1921 he joined Detroit Edison, where one of his first assignments was a study which led to the establishment of the company's motor transportation department. He was appointed superintendent of motor transportation in 1923.

HE LATER served in a number of departments including production, overhead lines, and purchasing.

From 1945 to 1952, he was chief engineer of lines and transportation. His years with the company saw a rapid industrial and population growth throughout South-eastern Michigan, during which the capacity of Detroit Edison's electrical system was increased more than ten-fold.

Since 1958, he has served the government as area deputy director for the defense electric power
