

Dog Training Opens
The Conservation department announced that the no-training of dogs period April 15-July 15, which protects nesting birds and animals, is over.
Hunters may train dogs afield between sunrise and sunset; no firearms other than pistols or revolvers with blank cartridges may be used while training dogs in this manner.
After Aug. 15 and until the opening of the season on raccoon, hunters may also train their dogs at night if they wish.

Detroit Pistons' general manager Nick Kerby stepped to the microphone to address Birmingham's 400 Babe Ruth baseball players and their fathers at the league's awards banquet last Wednesday. Also on hand was Bill DeWitt, president of the Detroit Tigers, who gave the boys some tips on big league baseball. Last year's outstanding Piston rookie, Bailey Howell, was flown in from Mississippi for the signing of his 1960-61 contract to highlight the program. League officials announced an exhibition basketball game between the Detroit Pistons and Cincinnati Royals scheduled for Oct. 12 at Seaholm high. Proceeds of the game will go to the Babe Ruth baseball program.

B'ham Racer Wins

Class B competition of last Sunday's stock car races at the Detroit dragway was won by 18-year-old Ted Spear, 920 Hazel, Birmingham. As a new entrant, his chopped and channelled 1931 Ford engine down the quarter-mile strip, Spear hit a top speed of 64 m.p.h. in 17.65 seconds.

Frank House had been sent to the minor leagues by the Cincinnati Reds. This is the same Frank House who collected some \$75,000 in checks for gifts and bonuses as a bonus for signing with the Tigers back in 1948. It was the highest bonus ever paid a player to that time.
House, supposedly a left-handed power hitter, was sent by the Tigers to their Flint farm club in the Class A Central league, which operated four years before folding its flag and fading away.
House performed well, but it became apparent to several league observers that he was a marginal major leaguer at best.
The league was a waystop for more promising talent—such as Minnie Minoso, Bob Buhl and Elston Howard.

FROM THE START, House couldn't consistently hit a good curve ball. And he couldn't "pull" the ball, either. He hit to center-field and right center.
Nor was the Bessemer, Ala. boy exactly the most ambitious performer around, either. He liked to enjoy himself after the game was over, after the break of day.
House eventually made his way through the farm system to the Tigers and played at Briggs Stadium a few years. But he was just another fellow with catcher's equipment. He was traded and started the rounds of the majors. Finally, Cincinnati, and now the minor leagues.

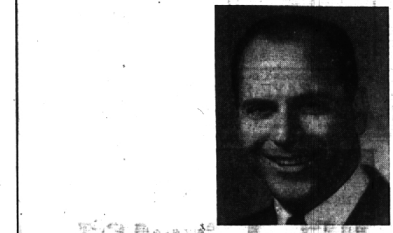
