In making the announcement to Miss Jeanne Lloyd, librarian, said that June 7 is the deadline for the return of juvenile SOS books.
EXPRESSING the Library's gratitude for the boys' and girls' help in storing books during the building of the new wing, Miss Lloyd said that a special "Thank You" party has been planned for these junior SOS helpers.
Consequently, upon the return of his juvenile books taken on long loan, each borrower will receive, in exchange, a ticket for this special boys' and girls' party.
Variety acts, games, and refreshments will highlight the lively celebration to be held at the community house.
