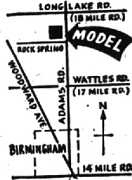

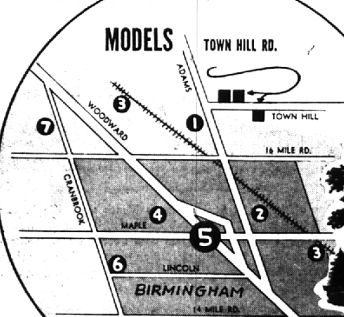

LATHRUP — The city council authorized Mayor Richard N. Cogger and City Clerk Frank Leroy last week to execute a fire protection contract with the city of Southfield.

The council approved amending the contract to allow "25 per cent of the amount bearing the maintenance to the Southfield department appropriated for fire department purposes... that the city of Lathrup equalized assessed valuation of lands and buildings bears to the combined equalized assessed valuation."
