SOUTHFIELD—Better grades and greater work may well result through Southfield school district's first typing course for children.

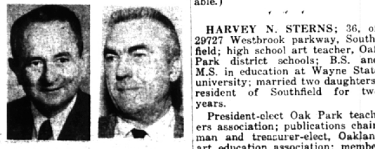
THE SKILL will provide youngsters with more time for homework and improve punctuality by relieving them of pressure when longhand is required.

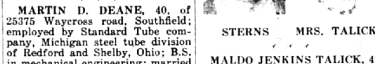

BACHELOR GOOD is a high school graduate, spent several years in the U.S. Army before joining the village force in May, 1948.

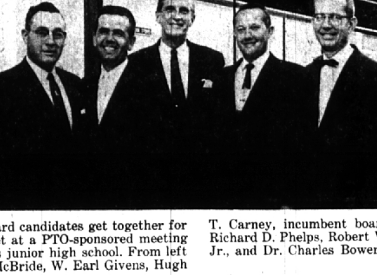
The promotions were recommended by Police Safety Director Robert Murphy, following completed written examinations conducted at the Detroit police department.
