County Boosts S'field's Share Of 15 Mills

SOUTHFIELD—Glen Schoenhals, superintendent of Southfield schools, was formally notified Tuesday that the Oakland county millage board has made a .14 mill boost in millage, increasing the Southfield district's tax rate from 9.35 to 9.52. The raise is based on increased state equalization valuation in the Southfield district.

The board of education was empowered by school district voters in June, 1957 and June, 1959 to levy to a total of six mills. Although the board has granted school the total millage, taxes could reach 15.92 per \$1,000 of state equalized valuation for operating expenses. Total amount of taxable property in Southfield district is \$127,965,010.

THE 9.52 MILLS is authorized under the 15-mill limitation by the county, which retains the balance. The six mills authorized by voters goes entirely to the school district. Schoenhals said he will probably ask the board to revise the budget in the next few weeks.

Increased funds will probably eliminate cutbacks in grade school instrumental music programs and the girls' physical education program, which were previously planned under the school budget. Some parents had been concerned over the cutbacks.

Lathrup Rec To Open Library During Summer

LATHRUP—The school library at Lathrup school will be open on playground days this summer under direction of the Lathrup recreation commission. A small fee will be charged for a card to use during the six-week program, and finances will go to a book purchase fund.

Library hours will be from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Mondays and Wednesdays, alternating with Thursday evenings. The library will be open on Thursdays every other week.
