\$44,000 Decision Is June 21

Approximately 40 residents of the 14 Mile-Lahser area attended a public hearing Thursday conducted by the Oakland county department of public works at Bloomfield township offices. No action was taken on the proposed \$44,000 improvement of drainage ditch near 14 Mile road.

A further meeting is scheduled at the Oakland county service building, 550 S. Telegraph road, Pontiac, June 21, when it is expected that final action will be taken.

A board composed of six Oakland supervisors and the drain commissioner was requested last June, by the township, to construct a facility and create a special assessment board. Engineers Hubbell, Roth and Clark of Birmingham, have prepared a plan that will enclose the presently open ditch from Forest Lane Crosswalk road. It will empty there at a natural watercourse. Total length will be 182 1/2 feet.

RESIDENTS in the ditch's area have complained that the ditch needs cleaning and that construction of a Marien high water pipe has contributed in part to storm water problems. Since the plan has an engineering approval, they protested the high individual cost, which they expect will run over \$400 to each of the 165 owners involved. If approved, another hearing will be held later, on appointment of cost.

William C. Ewart, city attorney of Pontiac, representing Robert Bird, spoke in favor of the improvement last week. Other opinions voiced were both pro and con. Homer Case, treasurer of Bloomfield township told The Birmingham Eccentric that the township request to the DPW was mandatory following petitions filed by the Birds, two other property owners, the Prudential Investment company, Detroit, and the Archdiocese of the Catholic Church of Detroit. Together they represent a majority of the drainage age of property in the drainage district.

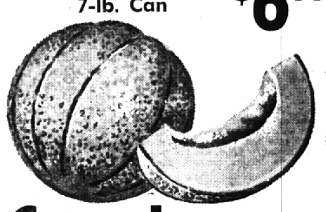
