ham city commission awarded the paving contract. Oak's \$62,768.20 was the lowest qualified bid, and includes the Redding storm sewer, paving of Willow lane from Redding southward 77 feet, and paving of Fairway from east of Pleasant to North-lawn.

Storm Damage Reported Light

Heavy rains and thunderstorms Monday and Tuesday caused relatively little damage in the Birmingham area. Police reported that the viaduct on Maple at Elton was flooded slightly and brief floods occurred on some other streets.

FLOODED BASEMENTS caused some concern but, according to the department of public works, water levels stayed below one and one-half inches. Michigan Bell Telephone company spokesman said that their storm damage was not unusually heavy. About 100 lines were affected by the storm in the Birmingham and Bloomfield areas. A few lines were downed causing brief delays in the Mayfair exchange.

Mrs. Hazel B. White

Mrs. Hazel B. White, former newspaper woman and a Birmingham civic leader, died of cancer. She was 65. She was the wife of Lee A. White, retired director of public relations of The Detroit News and editor of the Detroit News and a native of Washington state. Mrs. White graduated from the University of Washington in 1918. Reporter in West

After college she became a reporter in Stensburg, Wash., and later worked on all of the three Seattle newspapers for that time. She was an Associated Press writer from 1924 to 1930 in Paris and New York. Her first husband, the late Smith P. Reavis, was Paris correspondent and chief of AP foreign service. While he was in Paris his wife was European feature editor of the press association. After his death in 1940 she became a writer for Architectural Forum and other New York publications.

When World War II broke out Mrs. White joined the Office of War Information news staff and subsequently became assistant public relations director of the Coast Guard with the rank of lieutenant commander.

Met In College She and White had known each other since she was his student in the University of Washington journalism department. She went to college with him at the University of Washington. So, after Mrs. White's death in 1940, the widow and widower were married March 17, 1945, in Washington.

Mrs. White was a former director of the Birmingham League of Women Voters, the Birmingham Community House, the Oakland County chapter of Planned Parenthood and the Michigan Humane Society.

Active In Politics She also was active in the Birmingham Democratic Club. Surviving, besides her husband, are her mother, Mrs. Scott Benjamin, and a sister, Mrs. Esther Bowers, both of Seattle, and two other sisters, Mrs. Jessie Holcomb of Hyattsville, Md., and Mrs. Joseph Haskins of Long Beach, Calif.

Her family home is at 652 Brookside, Birmingham. Services will be at 4 p.m. Friday (June 17) at the funeral home of the William R. Hamilton Co., with the Rev. Tracy M. Pullman officiating. Cremation follows. Personal services. Contributions are being made to the Michigan Cancer Foundation.
