. . . And Modern Developments

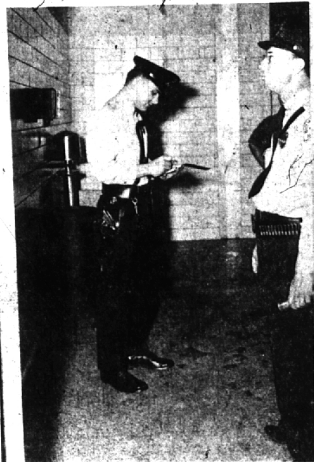

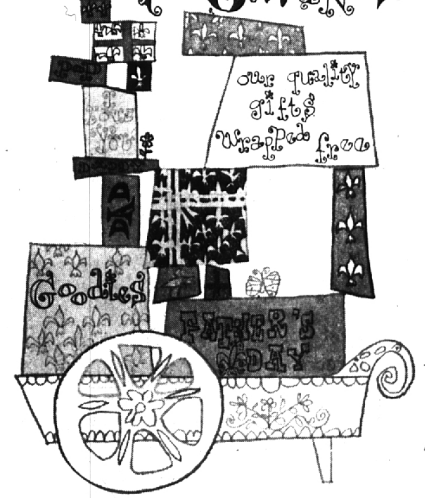
