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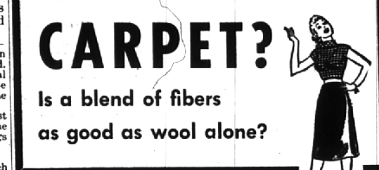
Map Leads Cast To Open House After Rehearsal

CARPET?

Is a blend of fibers as good as wool alone?

Carpet today are frequently a blend of one or more fibers. Naturally, how good the carpet is will depend on how good the fibers themselves are. When this is properly done (the best ratio is 70% wool and 30% nylon) the most desirable qualities of both fibers are realized. The nylon fibers add resistance to abrasion and the wool lends its properties of resistance to soil and overall luxurious appearance.

Because acrilan resembles wool more closely than other synthetic fibers it is not used as much in blends of carpet fibers. Acrilan does not add the extra wear that nylon does and is usually blended with another acrylic (nylon) to overcome its greater tendency to burn. No longer is acrilan a fire hazard. Reliable companies after considerable research have announced that no combination of fibers known today is superior to a blend of wool and good nylon because of those two fibers have characteristics that complement each other and produce a good result. One example will illustrate. Nylon fiber when set by heat will retain its shape after wetting or washing. When nylon is blended with wool and the shape is set into a tight twist, the ability of nylon to hold

shape helps the wool to hold its shape better than could good wool alone.

There is always someone who will cheapen any product by depending upon the public's inadequate information. Blends of wool and nylon, for as little as \$5.95 a square yard, Good carpet made of wool and nylon will actually cost nearly double that price. You must beware of "the false" which often masquerade as "the good". A store like Best Carpet Company offers you honest values and does not confuse you by offering carpets that look good but are too cheap to perform well. It is not likely that you can come to know carpet well enough to make an intelligent selection... but you can know to check up through Better Business Bureau, from friends and from your own estimate of a store itself. In a good store you usually get what you pay for. In a poor store you usually pay more than you realize for the bargain that attracts you. Many have found it so.
