We've left our mark, though: an outstanding academic record, out-



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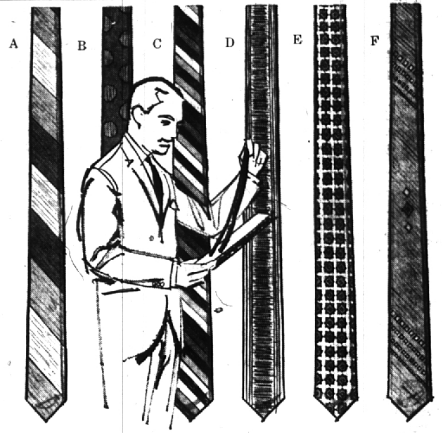
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Science, Jr.

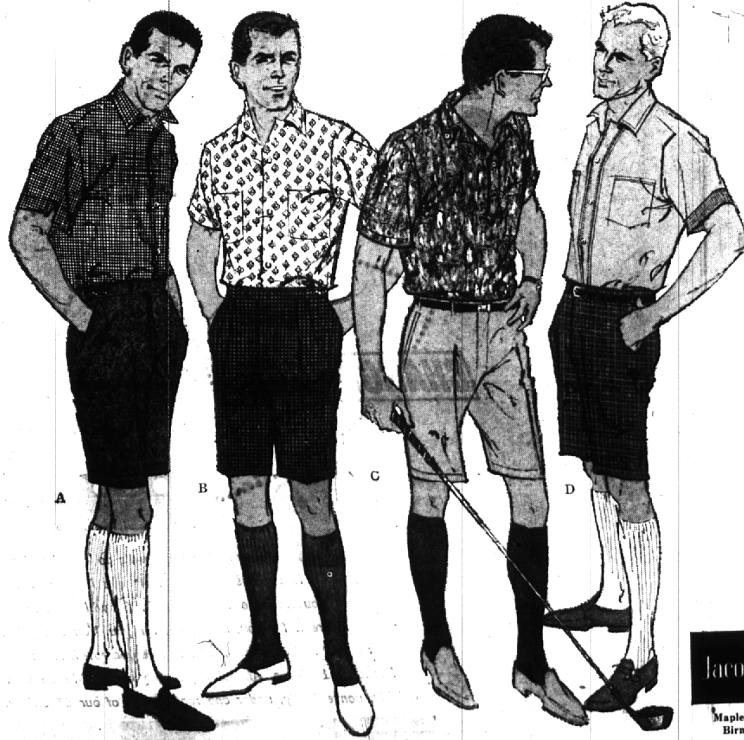

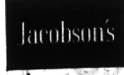
