**Consumers Power
Hints at Franchise
For Franklin Area**

FRANKLIN—Preliminary overtures for a franchise to bring gas service into Franklin were made by representatives of Consumers Power company Monday night.

Details of a proposed ordinance were discussed by the council, which countered with a modified version to be studied by gas company attorneys and reviewed July 11.

COMPANY representative C. Whitfield stated that though CPC once had a 30-year franchise in the village, it was not exercised because of an insufficient supply of gas and sparse distribution of homes. Additional supplies increased density of potential consumers and the proximity to areas already being serviced gave incentive to the new request.

Whitfield said that about how soon space-heating service could be expected, Whitfield said it would depend on consumer interest.

**Franklin Organizes
New Reading Club
For Youngsters**

FRANKLIN—Great Books, J.G. you might call it.

It's a reading club being organized for children in the second through sixth grades at the Franklin Community library. To continue through the summer from June 20 to Aug. 26, the Big Top reading club, is designed to encourage youngsters to explore the treasures of literature during the long vacation.

Two-hundred and seventy new books for the junior shelf have been loaned by the state library service. The only requirement for joining the club will be to read and report on a minimum of 12 books during the two-month period.

MEMBERS of the library board and Mrs. Walter Rodgers, librarian, will be on hand every Monday, Wednesday and Friday afternoon from 3 to 4 p.m. to help youngsters select books and to hear their brief oral reviews of books read.

A record will be kept of the reading and each child will receive a reading certificate at the end of the summer attesting full participation.

**Special Assessment
District Created
For Blacktopping**

FRANKLIN—Upon petition of 33 per cent of the property owners of Dorchester Hills subs, numbers 2 and 3, the village council took steps Monday night to create the first special assessment district for the blacktopping of roads.

Lot owners have agreed to pay \$350 per lot on Haverford, West Haverford and Grimshy lane, for the new surface, slated for construction in late August or early September.

A public hearing will review and establish plans, specifications and costs.

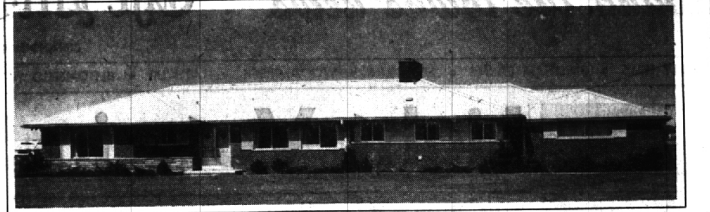

Dr. Bowers, a physician-surgeon, has been a lifetime resident of the area. He is president of Hickory Grove PTO and a member of the PTO council.

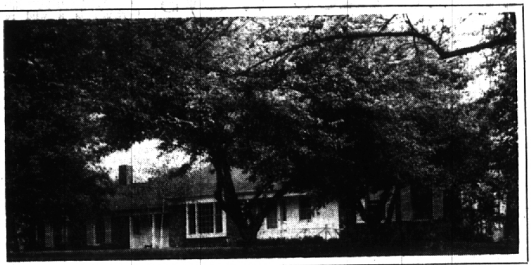

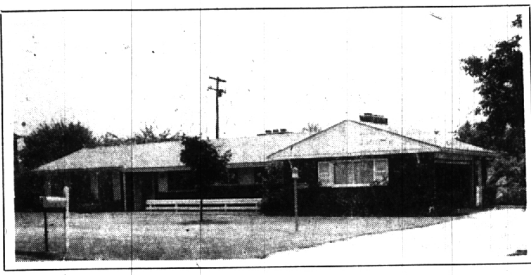

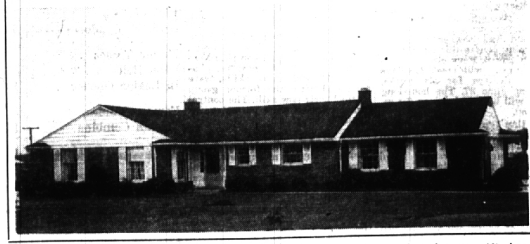
