## VILLAGE OF BEVERLY HILLS ORDINANCE NO. 35

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ORDINANCE NO. 29 ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE REGULATING AND RESTRICTING THE HEIGHT, NUMBER OF STORIES AND SIZE OF BUILDINGS; THE SIZE OF OPEN SPACES; THE DENSITY OF POPULATION; THE LOCATION AND USE OF BUILDINGS AND LAND FOR TRADE, RESIDENCE AND OTHER PURPOSES; FOR CREATING DISTRICTS FOR SAID PURPOSES AND ESTABLISHING THE BOUNDARIES THEREOF; PROVIDING FOR CHANGES IN REGULATIONS, RESTRICTIONS AND BOUNDARIES OF SUCH DISTRICTS; DEFINING CERTAIN TERMS USED HEREIN; PROVIDING FOR ENFORCEMENT; ESTABLISHMENT OF ZONING BOARD OF APPEALS; AND IMPOSING PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE."

The Village of Beverly Hills Ordains:

Section 1.01. That Ordinance No. 29 entitled "An Ordinance Regulating and Restricting the Height, Number of Stories and Size of Buildings; The Size of Open Spaces; The Density of Population; The Location and Use of Buildings and Land for Trade, Residence and Other Purposes; Creating Districts for said Purposes and Establishing the Boundaries Thereof; Providing for Changes in Regulations and Boundaries of Such Districts; Defining Certain Terms Used Herein; Provision for Enforcement; Establishment of a Zoning Board of Appeals; and Imposing Penalties for the Violation of this Ordinance" be and the same hereby is amended by amending the Zone Map attached thereto and made a part thereof as follows:

A. That the following described property is changed from a single family residential one zone use to retail business (B-2) zone use:

1. The South 87' of the South 146' of the North 291' of Lots 13 and 14, Crystal Springs Subdivision, except the Westerly 130' thereof;
2. The North 12' of the South 200' of the North 491' of Lots 13 and 14 of Crystal Springs Subdivision.
3. The South 61' of the South 200' of the North 491' of Lots 13 and 14 of Crystal Springs Subdivision.

B. That the following described property is changed from a single family residential one zone use to non-retail business (B-1) zone use:

1. The South 82' of the North 145' of the North 291' of Lots 13 and 14, Crystal Springs Subdivision, except the West 130' thereof.
2. The North 23' of the South 146' of the North 291' of Lots 13 and 14, Crystal Springs Subdivision, except the West 130' thereof.

C. That the following described property is changed from a single family residential one zone use to parking (P) zone use:

1. The North 63' of the North 145' of the North 291' of Lots 13 and 14, Crystal Springs Subdivision, except West 130' thereof.
2. 136' square of Lot 13 of Crystal Springs Subdivision as measured along Southerly and Westerly lines of said Lot 13.

Section 2.01. Public hearing having been held hereon on May 23, 1960, and the statutory notices having been published and mailed, the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be immediately necessary for the preservation of public peace, health and safety and are hereby ordered to take effect immediately upon publication.

Made and passed by the Village Council of the Village of Beverly Hills, Michigan on the 6th day of June, A.D. 1960.
