### May Use Eton Parking For Soil-Cement Test

Birmingham may be the first municipality in Oakland county to use soil-cement construction for a driving surface.  
City commissioners Monday night seriously considered this type of construction when an additional 100 parking space are built at Eton park, on the city's southeast side.  
City Commissioner Lance C. Minor has been a proponent of soil-cement construction, a method developed and used extensively in southern states. A few years ago, Geneva county in Michigan estimated costs of the relative type of roadway.

**THE PROCESS** involves mixing cement with gravel, then watering and rolling the mixture. An asphalt surfacing can be added if desired. It is reported to be considerably cheaper than regular cement or asphalt surfaces.  
City Manager J. R. Gare said it would be about a month before he can report back on the relative costs of the several types of construction.  
The city is considering a \$4,600 expenditure for 80 more spaces on the south side of Lincoln, eastward from the existing Eton parking area.

**THE FOREST HILLS** swim club has given the city \$2,500 to construct a parking area on the west side of Eton park, extending south from Lincoln.  
The club is building a private pool east of the park, and the parking lot would be used on a first-come-first-served basis.

**HE SPOKE** of Harry Golden, "the apostle of strum and funk," George Washington, who observed some very 20th-century faults in men of his time and mood—mostly his own.  
"I'm in favor of higher taxes," he said, "let's double 'em on cigarettes, cosmetics and liquor."  
Sandburg, the biographer-historian, gradually worked his way to the point where he would reach into a portfolio, pull out several sheets of typewritten paper, and read his "memorandum" on Abraham Lincoln.

**HE THEM** picked up his guitar and started to strum and sing.  
But the sun had set, and a cool breeze was blowing, and his 82-year-old fingers were very sensitive to temperature changes he reminded. Sandburg stopped after the third song.  
When the literary giant stepped off the speaker's platform, surrounded by admirers, he showed that great men are very human—they leaned forward and kissed the forehead of a wide-eyed red-haired girl.

### Ambulance Contract Extended by B'ham

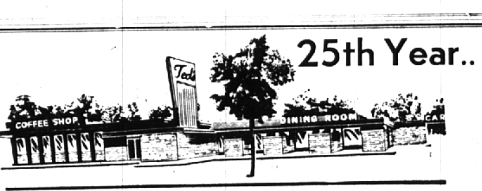
