Birmingham drivers cut their total accidents from 53 in April to 45 in May, and reduced the number of persons injured from 28 to 11, according to a report by Birmingham Police Chief Ralph W. Mosley.

Total accidents decreased by five from May, 1959, but the number injured almost doubled from last year.

Following too closely led the list of accident causes.

There was an encouraging substantial reduction in the number of right-of-way violations, Mosley said.

They were reduced from 19 in April to seven in May," he said.

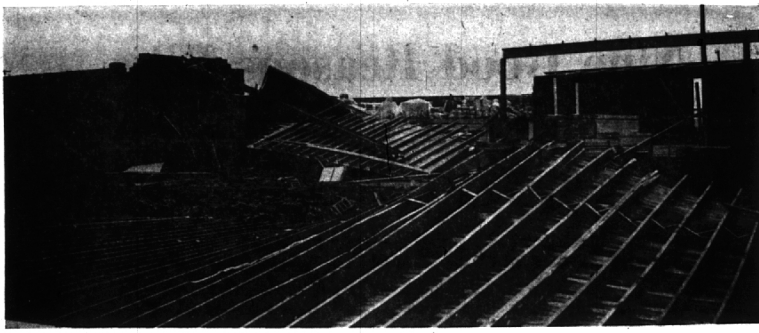
