### Beverly Hills To Connect Homes To Evergreen Soon

BEVERLY HILLS—When the Evergreen interceptor sewer is ready for use, anticipated by July 1, about 1,400 homes in the Acacia drain district and other portions of the village's eastern half will be connected immediately, village manager Robert Murphy said this week.

Murphy said the home owners will then be billed for the \$260 tap-in fee which will enable the village to pay its share of the Evergreen. Owners can finance the costs over a 10-year period. The charges collected will help the village meet the \$41,000 payment to the Evergreen which is due April 1.

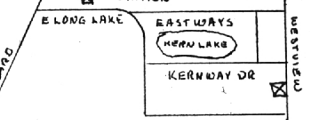

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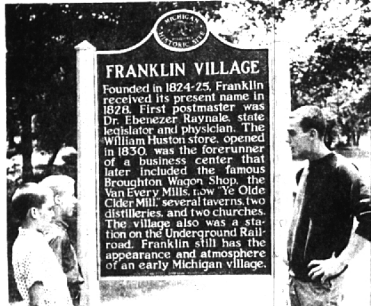
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### FRANKLIN VILLAGE

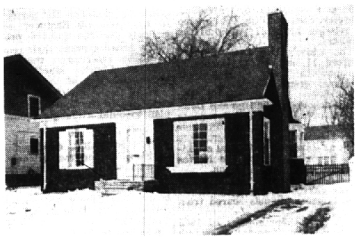

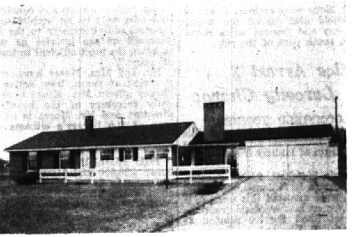

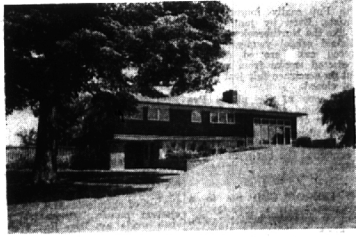
