

Traffic Code To Align Lathrup, State

LATHRUP—Traffic code ordinance 65 was adopted for first reading Monday by the Lathrup council. The vote was 3-0. The absence of Councilmen Vincent Zaitell and John Kohl kept the council with a quorum of three present.

Final adoption of the ordinance will provide the city with a uniform traffic code amended to fit local requirements. The code will streamline the handling of traffic violations by empowering City Administrator Jerald Stone, designated as traffic engineer, to study individual requests and issue temporary orders.

Stone said he "should be able to bring recommendations, after studying each problem, before the council and then let the council act on it." At the present many matters must be initiated before the council, resulting in a slower procedure.

LOCAL CHANGES from the code will ban gathering of crowds and soliciting at the scene of an accident and require vehicle passengers to report accidents if the driver is physically incapable of doing so. "No" passenger may ride in position inside a vehicle to obstruct driver's view. Riding on any part of the side of a vehicle is also prohibited.

Engine and power mechanisms must be adjusted to prevent fumes and smoke. No sound or warning device may be used in designated "Quiet" zones, except in emergencies. And sound amplifying devices are banned without special permit except for city use. Drivers may not back up more than 60 feet nor may they use private property or alleys to avoid traffic control devices.

Permits for parades and processions are mandatory except in the case of funerals, armed forces of the United States government and military forces of the state. All night parking can be eliminated where areas are posted banning 3 to 5 a.m. parking.

OTHER PARKING prohibitions dispense with parking for purposes of displaying a vehicle for sale, washing or repairing on local streets, displaying advertising, selling merchandise without a permit and storage for more than 48 continuous hours. The latter is amended particularly at eliminating Fuller and Mrs. Gene Gardulski are co-leaders.

Spreading of go-carts in school parking lots was discussed. It will be effectively prevented by prohibitions of speeds over 10 miles an hour on school property. Vehicles must stop before leaving school parking lots and property.

COURT APPEARANCES are required in cases involving speeding over 25 miles per hour; driving without an operator's license; reckless and drunk driving or while under the influence of narcotics. Allowing an unlicensed or drunk driver to use an owner's car will require a court appearance as well as failure to stop or report an accident. Failure to identify if a driver strikes a parked, unoccupied car will mean a court appearance also.

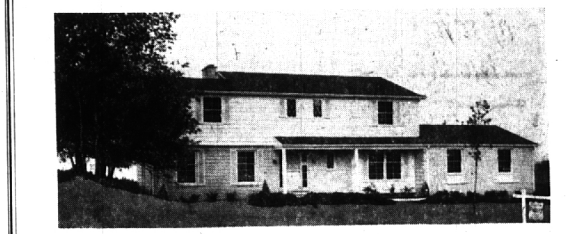
Beach on Lake Erie for a few days of well-earned rest.

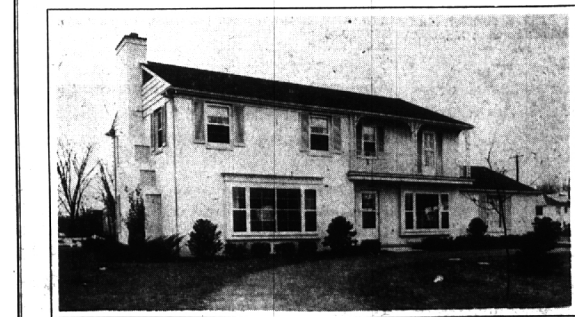
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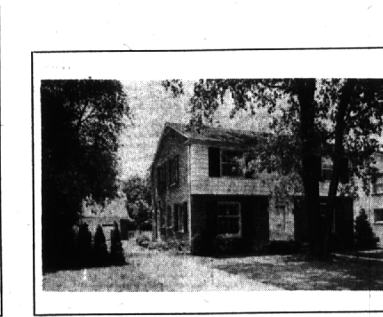
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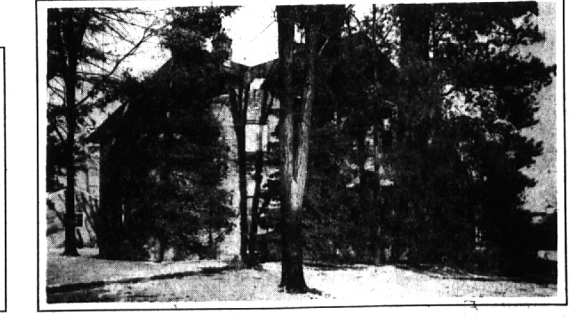
