## Beverly Adds Dust Control To Tax Bills

**BEVERLY HILLS**—As Village Clerk Fannie Adams can well attest after figuring them, Beverly Hills tax bills are going to be complicated this year. The bills will be mailed July 1, and will be due immediately.

Monday night the village council authorized the inclusion of charges for dust control in the department's dust control program. With the funds collected, the village will roll roads in an estimated cost of 12 cents per lineal foot, or chloride where requested.

A tax of 3.93 mills per \$1,000 of assessed valuation will pay for the village's regular operation. The rate is the same as last year.

**HOWEVER**, added to that will be another one mill, authorized for one year to finance needed road maintenance work.

Owners of vacant property serviced by the village weed-cutting program last year will also be charged on the current bill.

Coordinating Leo Linsmeayer, village roads chairman, said the assessments for dust control range from \$6 to \$18.70 per home.

**THEY WERE** figured on a lot benefit basis. Linsmeayer and Mrs. Adams divided the village into 18 districts, figured costs for the length of streets in each district. The total costs in each district were split among the number of units of property.

Linsmeayer said the village would pay the cost of more than one cutting, where it was necessary.

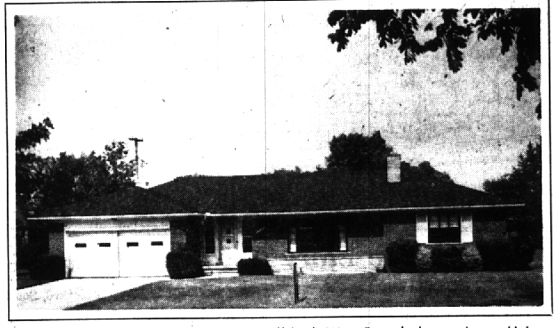

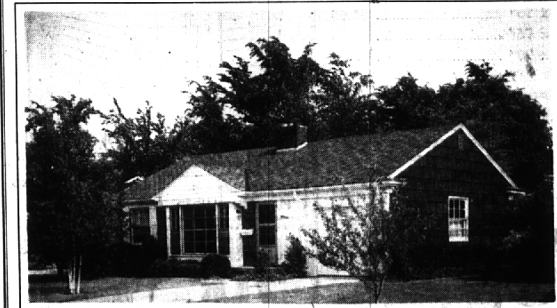

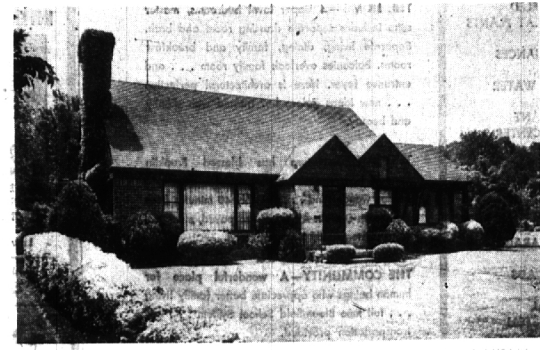
