Mrs. Frederick Brenner, sister of the bride, served as matron of honor. Ann Kathleen Swarthout of Birmingham was the flower girl.

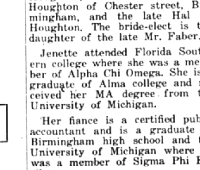
