

Lathrup's Latest Plans Told in City Newsletter

LATHRUP—Lathrup residents will receive their tax bills about July 1, according to the city's summer newsletter.

Redesigned for added clarity, bills will include an extra rate of \$1.39 per \$1,000 of assessed value to pay the annual installment of the city's share of the capital cost of the Evergreen interceptor. The rate will decrease with growth of

the city; the regular city tax rate remains at \$7.50 per \$1,000.

THE 1960-61 city budget allows a 50 per cent increase in revenue from funds, new police car and

equipment, and improved refuse collection with possible twice-monthly service.

Other budget items mentioned in the city's summer newsletter include sewer cleaning and repair, provision for storm water engineering, increased road maintenance of 140 per cent and \$22,000 for fire protection. City taxes provide about one-half of its revenue, the remainder coming from state sales and road taxes plus miscellaneous permits and fees.

The 1960 street paving program by special assessment has been changed to allow paving in concrete of four blocks, Santa Barbara, Woodworth Way and Withshire. Property owners will pay on a cash basis. Petitions and further information for residents wishing to start similar programs are available at the city office.

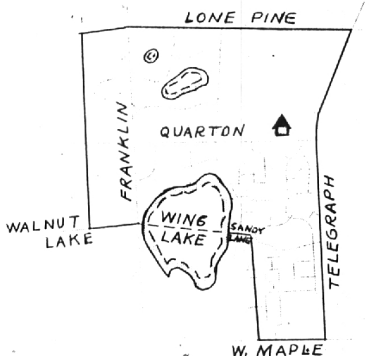
THE CITY IS completing major road preparation for repaving of the most badly winter-damaged streets. The DPW crew is making all repairs and trucking excavations from road repair areas to Lathrup school playground for fill. More than 800 loads have been dumped. The base of many gravel roads is now being improved to prepare for next winter, plus oiling and chloriding on a private contract basis with property owners.

THE NEWSLETTER also said the recent storm water survey drew responses from 372 residents. This plus study meetings with city engineers and representatives from interested neighborhood groups has been of assistance to the council in formulating new plans to solve sewer problems.

An extra spray is scheduled for July to control tree scale and the city reminded residents of its weed grass clippings and debris in vacant lots is also prohibited.

RESIDENTS WERE reminded that dogs must be licensed and vaccinated; dogs can now be protected for two years by a new type of rabies vaccine. Police also request motorists to notify them if they are leaving on trips and a vacation check list was included in the newsletter.

City offices will provide free booklets covering various aspects of civil defense and urged citizens to become informed.

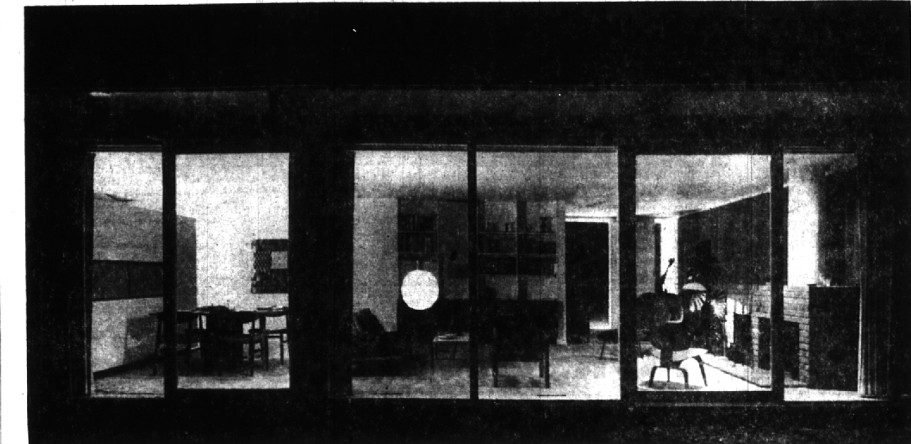

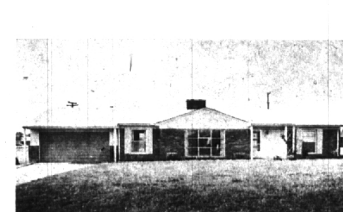
