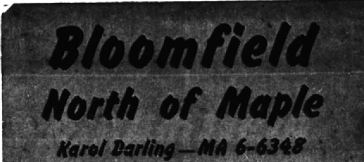
Bill was given his God and Country award in 1950 by the Rev. Robert L. DeWitt of Christ Church Cranbrook and became an eagle scout in 1958.

Sewer Fix Halts Building In Bloomfield

BLOOMFIELD TOWNSHIP—Monday night's meeting of Bloomfield Township board was routine which means that a large percentage of business before the board had to do with individual problems raised by development of sewer laterals in the township on a piecemeal basis.

The board brought building to a standstill in three township subdivisions until sewerage problems are solved in their areas.

No building permits will be issued for Knob Hills subdivision until its developers put in sewers which were conditional to board approval of the subdivision plan.

Building permits will be denied Williamsburg and Lone Pine Hills subdivisions until petitions for sewage laterals for the area are in the hands of the township board. Existing septic fields in the subdivisions have been causing pollution.

IN A MORE lenient frame of mind, the board allowed a year's extension to Bloomfield Country Day school for installation of a sewer lateral to serve the school, provided inspection during the year finds present facilities performing satisfactorily.

The board approved a \$39,000 contract for installation of Broughton Farms sewer lateral.

IT SET a date of Oct. 1 and five-year installments totaling \$130 for residents being served by Riverside Meadows sanitary sewer.

It accepted a petition for a first hearing for Colonial Hills sanitary sewer.

To Name Captain For Fire Staff Board Implies Right to Okay School Books

BLOOMFIELD TOWNSHIP—Bloomfield township fire department will have a third captain in its ranks in September when station number three at Telegraph and complete.

TOWNSHIP FIRE COMMISSIONER Homer Case is presently acting as chief of the department since the resignation of Ralph Hemmery six months ago.

The department has two captains, one for each station, and a first marshal for inspection purposes.

CASE SAID that the township board would rather bring a man up from the ranks for the chief's position than to hire an outsider.

"The time for such an appointment is tonight now," Case said. "We don't anticipate naming a chief this year."

He said that a chief would probably be selected by the combined results of a written examination and the recommendations from an oral exam given by a board of fire chiefs from other municipalities.

CASE, WHO HAS been fire commissioner for three years in addition to his duties as township treasurer, will continue as the commissioner in charge of the department.

BLOOMFIELD TOWNSHIP favors 1/2-mill levy.

BLOOMFIELD TOWNSHIP—Members present at Bloomfield township's board meeting Monday went on record favoring a special half-mill tax levy in Oakland county for the purpose of erecting a new county building.

They passed a resolution supporting the levy proposed by the county board of supervisors.

The millage increase will be voted on in the Aug. 2 primary.

VOTING IN FAVOR of the resolution were board members Homer Case, Sam Reeve, Robert Field and Arno Hulet.

Hulet is vice-chairman of the county board of supervisors.

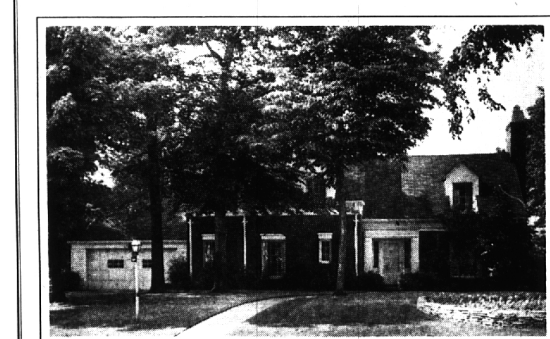
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
