Through a twist in the qualification requirements, the local school was enabled to enter two district tournaments last week-end and won both tournaments.

Under the Forensic association rules, any team finishing first or second in a recognized debate league can enter the district tournament.

The four-member squad—Dennis Smallwood, Julia Nagley, Lynne Morton and alternate Bob Knicker—came to Lansing, Mich., last Thursday.

"Patriotism" will be the subject of General S. L. A. Marshall's talk at the March 8 meeting of Piety Hill chapter DAR.

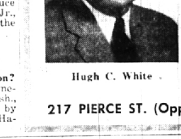

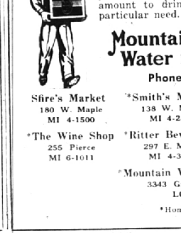

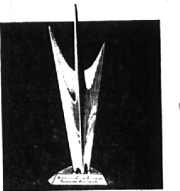
