has been endorsed by Valley Woods. Huck sent a letter to the council this week, thanking them because "in the last six weeks you have spent much time in helping us prepare a report."

"We would like to commend especially the efforts of Leo J. Linsenmeyer," Huck said.

For the past several months Linsenmeyer has personally assumed responsibility for liaison with village engineers who prepare cost estimates. Linsenmeyer said Monday he has been endorsed by the Beverly Manor, Beverly Artisan and West Beverly associations.

CANDIDATES (CLINE, Allerton and McLanathan have made no bids for endorsement, though Cline is supported by his South Berkshires association and Allerton by the West Beverly area in which he lives. McLanathan does not live in an association area.

(Continued from Page 1-E) of not more than \$3,500 each, under a land contract executed by the village and such owners, provided, however, that the necessary funds required are obtained as set forth in question 2 on this ballot.

2. SHALL the council of the village of Franklin be authorized to assess a special tax for a period of eight years of up to \$1.50 per \$1,000 of assessed value of all real and personal property in the village, as fixed by the assessment, in order to acquire, improve, maintain and to use the premises described in question 2, if said question carries, for village functions, a library and other community activities, such special taxes to be used only for the following purposes:

a. Paying in full the balance of \$20,000 after the installment of \$5,000 of the purchase price, plus all interest due thereon;

b. Maintaining, improving and operating such premises, and

c. Contributing to the Franklin library association for the operation of a library, such premises for use by village residents.

3. SHALL the zoning ordinance of the village of Franklin be amended to change the zoning of lot 41, supervisor's plat 28, from residential to professional?

THE CHARTER amendment proposal reads:

"Shall section 8, chapter 11, of the village charter be amended to provide as follows:

SECTION 8. The council shall not have the power to construct any new sidewalks in residential areas, except, however, the council may construct new sidewalks on Franklin road and Romany Way in the vicinity of the Franklin school if, and to the extent, the council deems it to be in the interest of the public safety and welfare.

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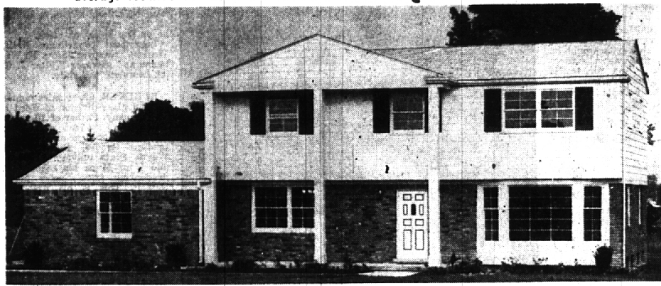
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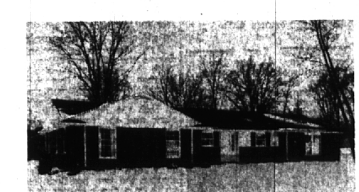

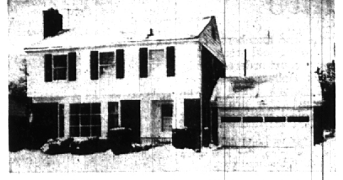
