

Writer Claims Community Hall Meets Other Need

To the Editor: I would appreciate the opportunity through your newspaper to present to the Franklin Villages residents essential information regarding two important questions that they will be called upon to decide at the polls this month. These are:

- 1. The question of rezoning the lot on Gorman Mill Road on which the old Community Church is located from residential to a new zoning class called "Professional"; and
2. The question of authorizing the Village to acquire the old Community Church for use as village offices, library and cultural center.

In addition, in late March, the Franklin Community will begin its campaign for donations to finance the building of a new Community Hall near the Village Green for use in various community activities.

It should be made clear that the recommendation on acquiring the old church did not contemplate that the building would be an alternate to the association's building. It was recognized that the building could not serve, except temporarily, as the place for the various community activities.

The difference between the two proposals is emphasized by the feeling expressed at the recent association meeting by members who do not live in Franklin that the association should not be expected to furnish space for village functions.

I would like to make one further point clear. This letter is not intended to persuade others to agree with my opinion (expressed as a member of the committee on the Village Hall) but rather to inform the public at large that the acquisition of the old church as a village office building is being considered. Rather, it is to help assure that those who disagree do so on the basis of an informed opinion and not because of a difference in knowledge of the facts.

Whenever someone decides for whatever reason, that it is better if the voters don't know or don't understand all the facts, the democratic process is being employed which is the very essence of the international import or is only a little village issue.

Treasurer Says Proposal Is Unsound

To the Editor: I am not opposed to libraries or culture—I do have an understanding of the other cultural activities of this church property has come before the council and the people of Franklin as the result of a non-judicial problem. PROPOSAL Shall the Village of Franklin purchase the property located at the southwest corner of Gorman Mill Road and Kelvin Street in the Village of Franklin, described as Lot No. 41 of Supervisor's Plat No. 8 of the Township of Southfield, Oakland County, Michigan, from the present owner, the Franklin Community Church, for use of Village functions, a library and other community activities, at a purchase price of not more than Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) with \$5,000.00 cash and \$20,000.00 in bonds immediately payable and with the balance thereof payable with interest at not more than 6 per cent (6%) per annum in annual installments of not more than Three Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$3,500.00) each, under a land contract executed between the Village and such other provisions, however, that the necessary funds required are obtained as set forth in Question 2 on this ballot?

QUESTION #1 Shall the Council of the Village of Franklin be authorized to assess a special tax for a period of eight (8) years of up to one and one-half dollars (\$1.50) per One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) of the assessed value of all real and personal property in the Village as fixed by the assessment roll in order to acquire, improve, maintain and use the premises described in Question No. 1, if said question carries, for Village functions, a library and other community activities, such special taxes to be used only for the following purposes:

- (a) Paying in full the balance of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) after the initial payment of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) of the purchase price plus all interest due thereon;
(b) Maintaining, improving and operating such premises, and
(c) Contributing to the Franklin Library Association for the operation of a library on such premises for use by Village residents.

QUESTION #2 Shall the zoning Ordinance of the Village of Franklin be amended to change the zoning of Lot #41, Supervisor's Plat #8, from Residential to Professional?

CHARTER AMENDMENT: Shall Section 5, Chapter XI of the Village Charter be amended to provide as follows: Section 5: The Council shall not have the power to construct any new sidewalks in residential areas, except, however, that the Council may construct new sidewalks on Franklin Road and Romany Way, in the vicinity of the Franklin School, if and to the extent, the Council deems it to be in the interests of the public safety and welfare.
