

B'ham Recreation Bd. Submits 1960 Budget

A basketball clinic in the summer? It would receive wide support, a Birmingham father recommended to the Birmingham recreation board at its meeting last week.

Board members also approved Director Don Martin's recommendation of a proposed summer basketball clinic. City commissioners will consider it at city budget sessions in May.

In a letter to the board, Ralph Schwarze, 1898 Webster, outlined advantages of a proposed summer basketball clinic.

He said a need has been felt for a year-around program to teach basketball fundamentals to boys in grades 7 through 12.

The recommended budget, more than \$6,000 above last year's \$97,730, was figured with the knowledge that the current budget year is expected to end with a \$8,000 surplus.

According to Recreation director, Martin, "This surplus, plus the anticipated \$2,000 in revenues, will almost completely offset the increase over last year's budget."

RECARDING THE basketball clinic, Schwarze said, "If the recreation board would provide the gym, a group of interested fathers would underwrite the rest of the

coach and any assistants."

Final decision will be made at the next board meeting. This will permit school board policy to be checked and Athletic Director Frank Whitney consulted.

In other action, the recreation director recommended the following capital improvements for recreation facilities:

- 1) Lighting for the municipal ice rink which would also be used for tennis during the summer.
- 2) Extension of the fence at Poppleton Park.
- 3) Benches for recreation areas.

W. Maple Church Parking Problem Greatly Relieved

Additional manpower and no-parking restrictions during church services has almost eliminated the Sunday traffic congestion at the W. Maple-Chesterfield area, according to Birmingham Police Chief Ralph W. Moxley.

He said additional parking lot ushers at the First Presbyterian and First Methodist churches "aided materially in moving traffic in to and out of the area."

MOXLEY SAID next Sunday—and continuing through Easter—Pleasant will be made one-way south during Sunday church services.

Area traffic flow pattern has been distributed to both congregations, Moxley said.

B'ham Reserved For B'ham Cubs

Despite the possibility they may be criticized for being against such things as motherhood, sin, and people, Birmingham city commissioners reaffirmed for their own residents the privilege of going from door-to-door on charitable projects.

The commission reluctantly denied a Beverly Hills cub scout pack permission to set camp in the southeast part of Birmingham.

"This is a difficult case," explained Commissioner Carl E. Ingraham, "but we must preserve this right for Birmingham groups—or our whole policy falls apart."

THE COMMISSION'S policy for years has been to limit such solicitations to an average of 12 a year and only to Birmingham groups.

Remarked Commissioner William E. Roberts: "Remember, Birmingham is a target area for such solicitations."

Said Commissioner Lance C. Minor: "I don't think it is cricket for people outside Birmingham to come in and ask for things which we sometimes have to deny our own people."

Committee Kills School Hopes for Millage Protection

School board hopes for state regulation of county allocations within the 15 mill tax today are dead for another year.

Senate Bill 1290, which would have frozen counties' shares of the 15-mill tax at present levels in school districts that have voted additional millage, died in committee, said Senator L. Harvey Lodge (R., Oakland county), their bill's sponsor.

The bill, urged on Senator Lodge by Birmingham board members, met with considerable opposition in committee.

The simple fact that it was introduced at this time will give the bill some hope for passage in the 1961 session, Lodge said.

Navy to Honor Rescue Pair

TROY—The navy department will honor a former Berkeley man and a Troy volunteer firefighter for their heroic actions in March, 19— for risking their lives to pull a navy pilot from his crash-landed plane, Feb. 13 in a Troy cornfield.

Kenneth Caldwell, 32, formerly of Berkeley, now of Rochester, and Neil Allen, 21, of 476 W. Square Lake, Troy, will get citations at the annual review of reservists at the Grosse Ile naval air station.

Troy Sets Policy On Construction Of City's Sewers

TROY—A sewer policy was set up by the Troy city commission Monday after a three and a half-hour discussion.

The group decided they will not accept the county drain commission's offer to build the Evergreen sewer outlet from Coolidge and Square lake into the city for an estimated \$221,092. Instead, the city will investigate doing the itself, as far as Beach road and not into Bloomfield township, as the county chose to build it.

The city will condemn 15 year-lot easements still held by Pine Hill residents and install trunk sanitary sewers for the Pine Hill and Meadowlark subdivisions at the rear of properties.

The city will establish three separate sewer assessment districts.
