roaco, and came back well tanned. of the boat trip as this is the third we accompanied by some friends from Indianapolis, Ind., their former home town.



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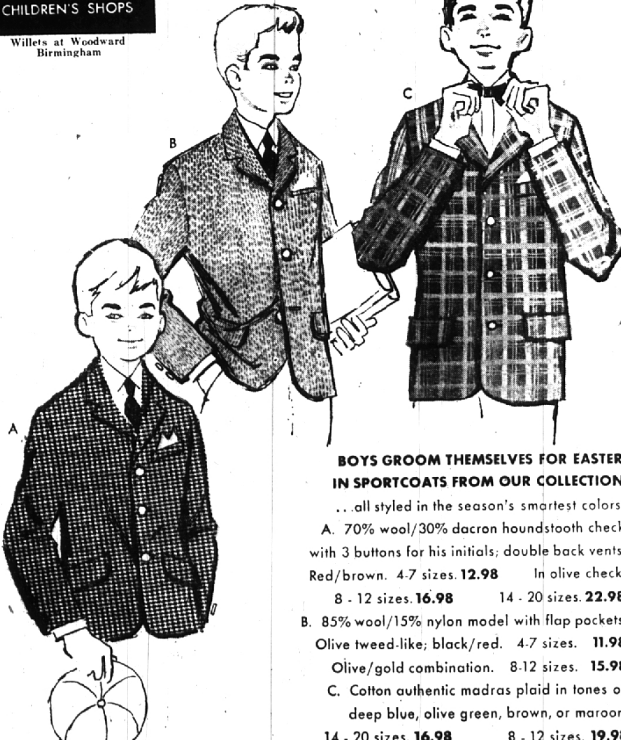
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
