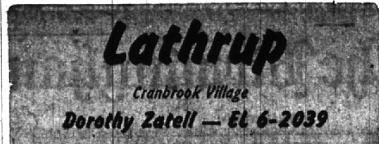

**1 Bill Down,  
1 Moves Up  
For Clarkson**

LANSING—Two bills sponsored by the Southfield area's representative in the state legislature, S. James Clarkson, (D-4th district) made news this week.

A bill to allow referendum votes on city zoning disputes died in a house committee. It had been co-sponsored by Rep. Clarkson and William S. Hayward (R-5th district).

A second bill prohibits hospitals from holding patients until their bills are paid. It passed the house Friday.

Clarkson said after the approval, "Any denial of hospital services based upon monetary considerations would be contrary to Christian principles."

"THE GREAT majority of hospitals in Michigan would never be affected by this bill, since they consider the practice it outlawed reprehensible. The bill is aimed at the minority of cases where this practice has occurred."

The referendum bill was introduced by Clarkson following a city of Southfield case.

The city granted commercial zoning to the Ira Kaufman funeral home to permit construction of a funeral home on Nine Mile near Northwestern.

Nearly 2,000 residents petitioned for a referendum vote on the rezoning. The Southfield council rejected the petitions on the grounds that a referendum would not be legally binding.

CLARKSON'S bill, which he may introduce again next year, would allow city or village residents to zone by popular vote, a power now granted only to townships.
