Walnut Lake Club Celebrates Anniversary

WALNUT LAKE—Walnut Lake Men's club members will celebrate the 25th anniversary of the founding of the club with a dinner-dance Saturday in the clubrooms.

A cocktail hour will precede the catered dinner served to members and their ladies. Dancing will follow.

The club was formed in February of 1935 by six residents of the community and has grown to a membership of 60 increasing its participation in civic affairs, youth programs and public improvements.

THE SIX MEN conceived the idea of a men's club "for the betterment of the community." Within a few weeks the membership has risen to 15. The first important effort of a club was made by bringing attention to the need for paved roads on Inlander and Walnut Lake roads.

After obtaining the paved roads, the Men's club turned its attention to the protection by holding auctions, dances, fairs and drives for contributions for the first fire engines for the area. Later activity by the club obtained street lighting for the shopping area and the Walnut Lake elementary school.

LONG AWARE of the need for teenagers to have a healthy association in their community, the club's next project was the sponsoring of a boy's club, supervising its activities and providing leadership and guidance for the youngsters. The Men's club also has its social side. Regular Friday evening meetings are supplemented by dinner-dances, buffets and parties at Halloween, New Year's Eve and Valentine's Day.

THE CURRENT quarters of the Men's club are clubrooms made available by Claude Whitmer and are located across from the Walnut Lake shopping area. Newcomers to the area are welcome to attend the Friday evening meetings.

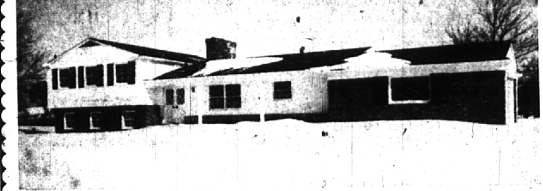

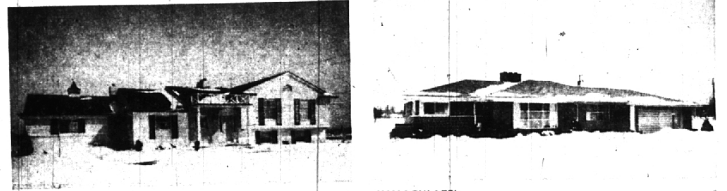

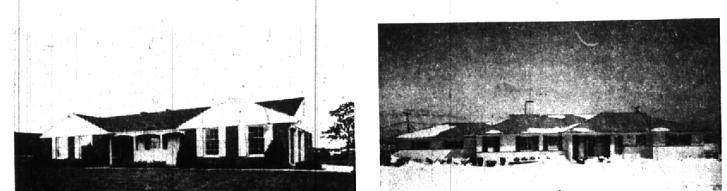
