'Pooped Parents' Topic Of Pine Lake Speaker

PINE LAKE—Today's "real beat generation, pooped parents," will be examined in a talk by Dr. Richard Kerckhoff, leader of Merrill Palmer school's community organization and development program, which emphasizes the role of families in communities.

Speaking at the March 21 meeting of the Pine Lake PTO, Dr. Kerckhoff will describe certain types of parents whom he labels "Family Enemy Number 1" and "Family Enemy Number 2." In discussing "Family Living in Our Modern America," he plans to give recognition to the need for the exercise of talent and technique in family life, leading to the development of Art of Family Living.

DR. KERCKHOFF received his doctorate in sociology from Ohio State University and taught courses in family living and community organization there as well as at the University of Michigan, Wayne State University and Colorado State University before assuming his present position at the Merrill Palmer school. He is an active member of the American association of Marriage Counselors and the National Council of Human Relations.

Following the talk, Dr. Kerckhoff will answer questions of general interest.

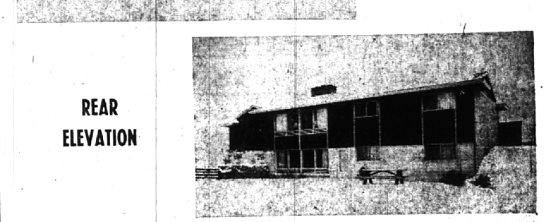
