Should roses be pruned in the spring?

Southfield News Briefs

Kaufman Wins Zone Dispute

SOUTHFIELD—Southfield voted Monday not to change from commercial back to residential zoning for the Kaufman funeral home property on Nine Mile road west of Northwestern in Southfield. More than 100 residents attended the meeting. Some 2,000 had signed petitions in December demanding a referendum on the Aug. 2 primary ballot. Attempts to detain the approval met with defeat.

Kaufman, after almost two years delay, was granted commercial rezoning last July. Residents have been objecting since that time. Construction will begin in April.

2 Hurt in Accident In Southfield

SOUTHFIELD—Two persons were injured March 9 in an accident at 12 Mile and Southfield. Treated at Beaumont hospital were Walter G. Huffard, 67, of Detroit, and Calvin Mason, 29, of Pontiac.

Southfield OK's East-West Route For 10-11 Mile

SOUTHFIELD—The East-West expressway's route through Southfield was approved for a one-mile corridor—on or near Ten Mile or Eleven Mile from Inkster to Greenfield—Monday night by the Southfield city council.

The city's decision ended 19 months of dispute over the route. It establishes that the limited access highway 696, linking U.S. 16 and eventually hooking with the Ford expressway in Macomb county, will use the Ten to Eleven Mile corridor through all of south Oakland county.

Construction is scheduled to begin in December on the big expressway, state highway officials told Southfield this week.

Where the East-West intersects with Northwestern and Telegraph, a 70-acre interchange is planned. It has been called the "Cadillac square of metropolitan Detroit." It will end at Lahser just south of 11 Mile.

Southfield finally gave approval with the threat of the 1960 census establishing population at a level that would force the city to participate in the X-way's cost.
