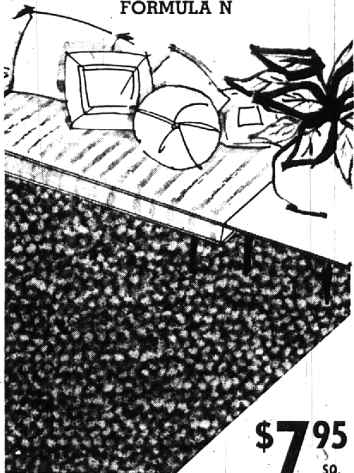

FIVE MORNING courses are offered, each meeting from 9:30 to 12:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. A sixth program, junior science is offered to boys ages 9 to 11 who are enrolled in one of the morning programs. The young scientists will meet on Tuesday and Thursday afternoons until 3:30.

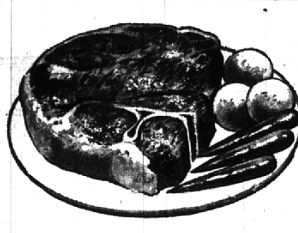

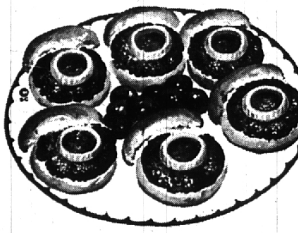

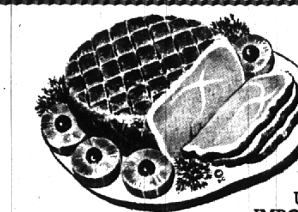
