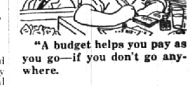
South-Oak Divvy On Assessments Slated April 8

SOUTHFIELD — The proposed assessment division of the South-Oak drain (formerly the Eight Mile) will be reviewed at 10 a. m. April 8 at the pumping station, West Eight Mile at Mierwood, Southfield.

Under the new drain plan, Southfield and Oak Park will determine the assessment divvy, not the county. Total cost of the huge storm drain is estimated at \$1,900,000. It runs along Eight Mile from Oak Park west to the Rouge.

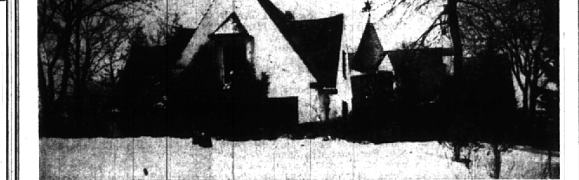

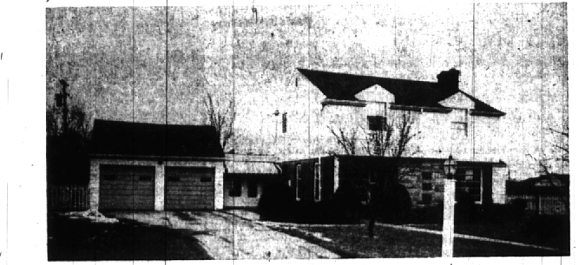
