State Rep Says Senate Is Blocking Con-Con

In a statement issued this week, State Representative S. James Clarkson (D-4th district) urged citizens to sign the constitutional convention petition being circulated by the Junior Chamber of Commerce and the League of Women Voters.

"The representative of the Southfield area in the legislature said the 1961 constitutional convention has been dealt a damaging blow ironically, by a Senate bill which calls for a constitutional convention."

The Senate on March 8 voted to place the question of a constitutional convention on November, 1960 ballots, Clarkson explained. However, the Senate's plan does not allow a vote on how delegates would be chosen.

Clarkson said the con-con proposal backed by the JC and League groups would elect one con-con delegate for each Representative or Senator to which their district is entitled. The proposal was backed by both Gov. Williams and Republican gubernatorial hopeful Paul D. Bagwell.

"ONLY A defeatist political party would oppose democratic representation on the grounds that a majority of voters prefer the other party. I would hope that even the opposition party would have hopes of becoming the state's majority party at an early date."

"When enough citizens want to hold a constitutional convention to modernize their state's Constitution."

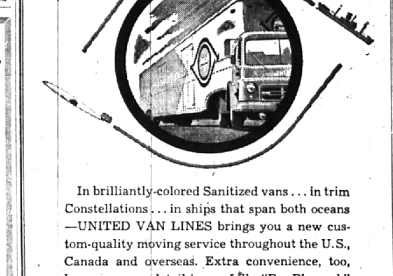

THE COUNCIL prepared its annual budget, with operating expenses matching the anticipated \$2575 income from the state. An item of \$900 was included in the road budget for legal expenses in view of pending litigation brought by property owners at the southwest section of the village along Telegraph road.

A copy of the budget will be posted and a hearing will be held the fourth Monday of April before its adoption.

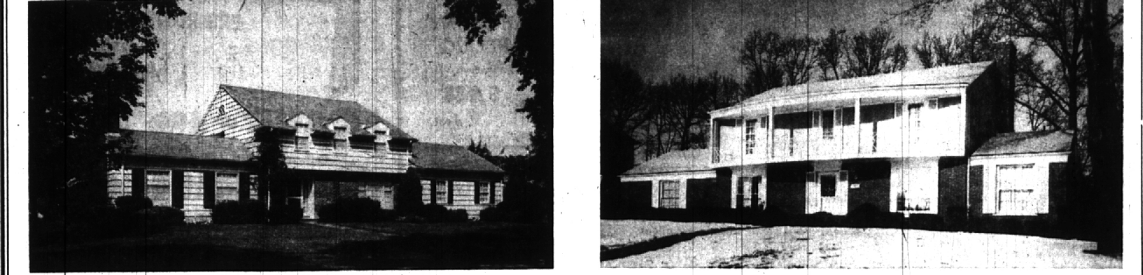

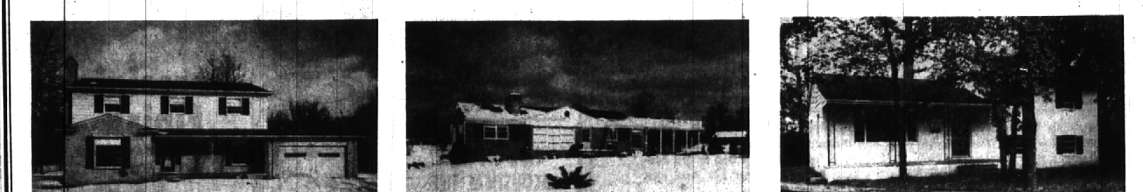
