### Lathrup Intervention Petitions Get Review

LATHRUP—Matching Latin quotations with Attorney James Renfrew Monday, Judge H. Russell Holland gave Lathrup an ominous warning that the "Tempus Fugit" for the city.

A hearing was held by Judge Holland Monday morning on two petitions to intervene in the case of Lathrup vs. the state water resources commission. Attorney James G. Hartwick represented 22 petitioners among whom are Louise Lathrup Kelley and ex-councilwoman Kathryn Feyereisen. Attorney Renfrew represented 11 petitioners, whose number includes J. A. Farina, Fred Farris and Fred Hirtzel.

Judge Holland promised a decision on the intervention within a few days after he receives summary briefs from all attorneys concerned.

BEFORE Hartwick was permitted to present his case to the court, he was asked for clarification on three points by Judge Holland.

"What bothers me," said Judge Holland, "is the interveners are coming in to ask the court to do something it has no power to do."

The judge also asked if the interveners want him to tell the city fathers to listen to them, or if they are using the court as a listening board. He also wanted to know if the groups favor combined or separate sewer systems.

HARTWICK said his group wanted to follow the plan of a competent engineering firm, construct a separate sanitary system and build a storm water system at lower cost than the proposed \$750 thousand plan recently voted down.

In presenting his case, Renfrew told the court that his group believed the powers of the court to be "extraordinary." It was his contention that the court could

### B'field to Vote On Zone, Plan Board Changes

BLOOMFIELD TOWNSHIP—the zoning board is dead—long live the township planning commission! That is the proposition Bloomfield township voters will be asked to ratify at the Aug. 2 primary.

PRELIMINARY preparation for transferrance of zoning board powers to a township planning commission was made Monday when the township board of trustees voted to create a township planning commission, under Act 108, adopted last year.

OTHER BUSINESS transacted by the board Monday was financial. A low bid of 3.75 per cent interest made by Manufacturer's National bank on special assessment bonds for improvement of the Charing Cross water system, was accepted.
