**3-Story Luxury Apartments Get Second Rebuff**

There'll be no three-story luxury apartments on Woodward north of Bloomfield court, it was reaffirmed Monday night by Birmingham city commissioners.

They formally denied a petition of the Wallace J. Newton Co. for a change in zoning to R-7. The property now is R-5 multiple.

Several weeks ago on the recommendation of the city plan board, Newton's petition had been turned down unless a formal hearing was requested.

**NEWTON** and his representatives said Birmingham definitely needs such quality apartments, and his was only possible if he could build three story high. Residential property owners to the west and multiple owners to the east of the Newton parcel objected to the additional height.

Under present zoning, and by court decree, 85 terrace units can be constructed there.

been ordered to draw up condemnation papers in the event any parcel cannot be obtained through negotiation.

Owners of the largest part of this proposed 3-acre plot are Wallace C. Jacobsen's, Inc., who have been among the leaders in the development of Birmingham parking areas.

IT IS EXPECTED that both these companies will cooperate as much as necessary in the city's development of this parking lot for the northwest business quadrant.

Before the city became active in parking lot construction a half dozen or so years ago, Wabcock and Jacobsen's acquired extensive holdings in the northwest quadrant and developed them as private lots.

IF THE CITY acquires the new site, it still will leave considerable Wabcock's acreage for parking on the south side of Willets street.

The city would have to acquire additional properties from Wallace Frost, A. H. Meyer and M. E. Snyder. The lot roughly would include the area south of the River Rouge, east of a line along the west side of N. Bates street.

**MOST PROBABLE** financing of the site would be through revenue bonds and special assessments on benefited businesses, although there are other ways which would be determined more desirable, Garg explained.

The city now has 525 spaces in these lots. Hamilton-Ferrald (175), Merrill-Pierce (231), Hamilton-Jones (453) and Forest-Brownell (66).

They have been financed on a long-term basis with the large share being paid by the city.

**CITY ASSESSOR** Clark Hagstrom already has drawn up his tentative special assessment district.

Starting at Martin and Chester — north on Chester to Willets, east to Bates, north to the south side of the Baptist church, west to the rear property line of the Bates-Brownell lot, south to the north side of the Ridge River, east to Woodward avenue, north to Havine, south along the east property line of Woodward frontage to Oakland (including the northwest corner of Oakland and Forsdale), south on Forsdale and through the alley to Maple, diagonally southwest to include the corner to Pierce, west through the alley to Pierce, south to Martin, and west to Martin to north of business.

THE CITY would not acquire existing businesses at the north-west corner of Willets and Woodward, Garg said.

There are 200 surface parking spaces there now.
