Mrs. Timothy J. McCarthy, Jr., has been named alumnae chairman for the Marygrove college development fund as the campaign for 1960 gets under way this week.

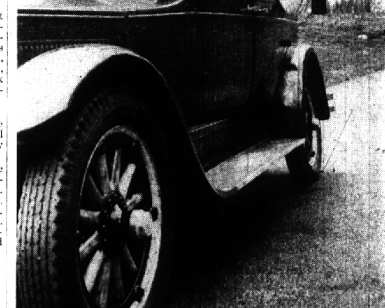
The announcement of her appointment and the opening of the campaign was made today by Kenneth G. Tiffany, chairman of the Marygrove college board of directors.
