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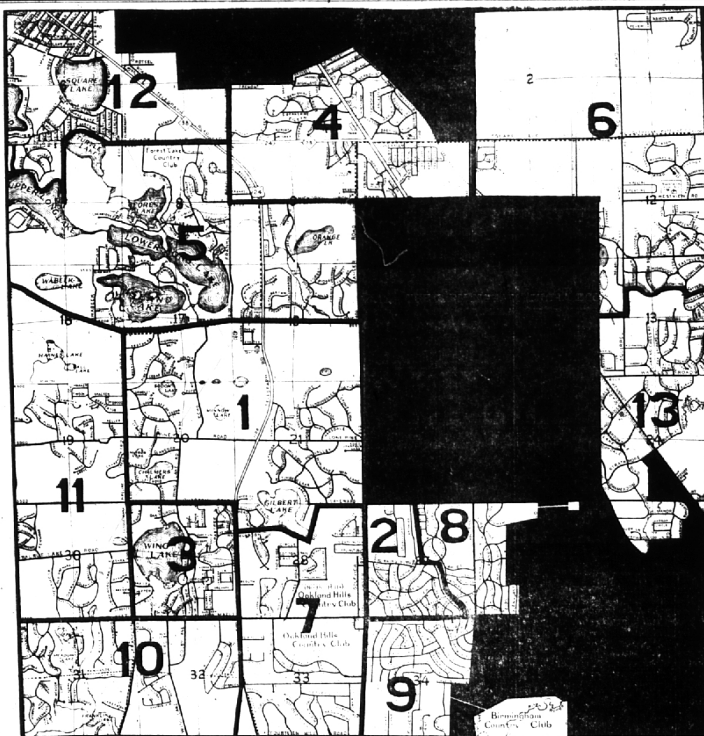

TO THE ELECTORS OF BLOOMFIELD TOWNSHIP: YOU WILL PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that by action of the Bloomfield Township Board on March 14, 1960, voting precincts for the Township of

Bloomfield have been re-arranged, effective April 1, 1960. Boundaries of the precincts as re-arranged and polling places have been designated for each precinct are as follows:

- PRECINCT NO. 1**
Polling place at Bloomfield Township Hall, 1200 Telegraph Road.
Bounded on the north: West Long Lake Rd. — east: Labser Rd. — south: Quanton Rd. — west: Franklin Rd.
- PRECINCT NO. 2**
Polling place at Bloomfield Village School.
Bounded on the north: Quanton Rd. — east: Ely boundary of Redka Sub. & Williamsbury Rd. (both sides) — south: Maple Rd. — west: Labser Rd.
- PRECINCT NO. 3**
Polling place at Wing Lake School, NW corner of Wing Lake Rd. and Maple Rd.
Bounded on the north: Quanton Rd. — east: Telegraph Rd. — south: Maple Rd. — west: Franklin Rd.
- PRECINCT NO. 4**
Polling place at Hickory Grove School on Labser Rd. between Square Lake and Hickory Grove Rd.
Bounded on the north: Pontiac City Limits — east: Pontiac City Limits and Opdyke Rd. — south: Hickory Grove Rd. — west: Franklin Rd.
- PRECINCT NO. 5**
Polling place at Bloomfield Hills High School, 1200 Anderson Rd., south of Long Lake Rd.
Bounded on the north: S. side of Upper Long Lake N. on S. 1/2 Sec. 7 to the N. shore of Turtle Lake; then along Square Lake Rd. to Franklin Rd.; S. on Franklin Rd. to Hickory Grove Rd.; E. on Hickory Grove to Labser. — east: Labser Rd. — south: West Long Lake Rd. — west: Township Limits.
- PRECINCT NO. 6**
Polling place at Bloomfield Township Fire Station #2, on W-35-view Rd., between Adams Rd. and Scovell Rd.
Bounded on the north: Township Limits — east: Adams Rd. — south: S. 1/2 line of Eastover Farms #1 and Woodcrest Lake Sub. — west: Bloomfield Hills City Limits and Opdyke Rd.
- PRECINCT NO. 7**
Polling place at Brother Rice High School on Labser Rd. between Maple and 14 Mile Rd.
Bounded on the north: Quanton Rd. — east: Labser Rd. — south: 14 Mile Rd. — west: Telegraph Rd.
- PRECINCT NO. 8**
Polling place at Bloomfield Village Fire Hall on Bradway Blvd., E. of Labser and N. of Maple Rds.
Bounded on the north: Quanton Rd. — east: Birmingham City Limit — south: West Maple Rd. — west: Glenngary Rd. (both sides) in the S. 1/2 of Section 21 and E. boundary of Redka Sub. (N. 1/2 Section 21) included; also that part of the NE 1/4 of Section 26, not in the City of Birmingham.
- PRECINCT NO. 9**
Polling place at Marian High School on Labser Rd. between Maple Rd. and 14 Mile Rd.
Bounded on the north: Maple Rd. — east: Cranbrook and City Rd. — south: Birmingham City Limit — west: Birmingham City Limit — also Birmingham Country Club in S 1/4 of Section 35, not in the City of Birmingham.
- PRECINCT NO. 10**
Polling place at Bloomfield Township Fire Station #3, corner of Woodbank and Maple Rds.
Bounded on the north: Maple — east: Telegraph Rd. — south: 14 Mile Rd. — west: Inkster Rd.
- PRECINCT NO. 11**
Polling place at Bloomfield Hills Junior High School, on Quanton Rd. between Telegraph and Wing Lake Rds.
Bounded on the north: West Long Lake Rd. — east: Franklin Rd. — south: Maple Rd. — west: Inkster Rd.
- PRECINCT NO. 12**
Polling place at Washington Irving School, 1530 Square Lake Rd. — east: Telegraph Rd.
Bounded on the north: Township limits and Pontiac City Limits, east: Franklin Rd. — south: Square Lake Rd. and N. shore of Turtle Lake to 1/4 Section line of Section 7, south on section line to the north shore of Upper Long Lake — west: Township Limits.

Polling place at Harlan School on Adams Rd., between Wattles & Big Beaver Rds.
Bounded on the north: S. line of Eastover Farms #1 and S. line of Woodcrest Lakes — east: Adams Rd. — south: Birmingham City Limits. — west: Birmingham Hills City Limits and Birmingham City Limits.

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
