To Combine Public Work Functions

TROY — City commissioners started working on combinations last week. The voting majority started toward combining the DPW, engineering office and water department under a director of public works. They also plan to bring in a full-time planner.

THE RE-SHUFFLING would eliminate City Engineer Joseph Shugart, DPW Supt. Carl Campbell, and Planning Consultant George Villan, Jr.

Lukevarn, Commissioners Wallace E. Hudson and Vinson J. McAvoy, agreed that City Manager David W. Hasse should bring in a broad array of supervisory costs of the public works departments.

The plan would eliminate the need for an assistant city manager; foremen could replace Shugart and Campbell.

SHUGART gets \$9,000 per year; Campbell, \$7,200. To hire qualified foremen for the foremen's positions, along with the other changes, could cost \$5,000 or \$6,000 more per year, Wallace said.

Troy's budget allots \$3,648 per year for planning. The city should hire a full-time man for that figure, commissioners said, rather than pay that for an outside consultant.

The commission also approved a Hasse's pay plan for city employees.

THE PLAN is designed to bring Troy's wages more in line with those of neighboring communities, Hasse said.

The individual wage increases range from \$225 to \$345. Fifty-nine per cent of the present budget is slated for wages. The present plan would raise the percentage to 64. Most other communities spend about 75 per cent of their budgets for wages, the city manager said.

Agree or Not? Burke and Yanich Can't Quite Do It

TROY — City Attorney Stanley E. Burke and Commissioner Louis Yanich do not agree as to whether the city should agree to the sale of its share of the costs of the Evergreen interceptor.

Yanich claims the city was unfairly charged. Burke's reply pointed out that the county's five per cent contingency for the project is permitted by law.

The county has the right to determine what will be done with Federal money granted for the project.

Troy's share for a section to be installed in Bloomfield township was agreed upon by a representative of the city.

TROY — Jim Robbins' expansion plans for his plastics processing plant will have to be curtailed, since the state highway department refuses to remove the northwest quadrant of an interchange in the proposed route of the Chrysler expressway at 14 Mile and Stephenson, near the plant site.

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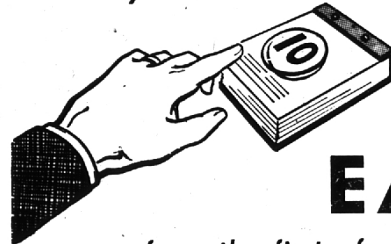
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
