Franklin Library Annual Meeting Scheduled May 19

FRANKLIN—Ending one of the best years in several, the Franklin Community Library will hold an annual meeting and election of new officers at 8 p.m. May 19 at the Franklin Community church.

Though the library failed to get a new home as a result of voters turning down the March ballot proposition for the village to purchase the old community church for municipal purposes, they have enjoyed greater support from the community than ever before.

It is hoped that the interest which has been shown in the membership drive approaches so that new books will continue to replace old volumes. The library has sponsored a great books discussion course this year which is expected to be continued as members have undertaken leadership training.

Annual Meeting Set By Franklin WNFGA

FRANKLIN—The Franklin WNFGA will hold its annual meeting May 9 at noon at Sylvan Glen golf club.

Following luncheon and the business meeting, Miss Elizabeth Wayne of the J. L. Hudson speakers bureau will speak on "Music In My Path." Objections On Salaries, Roads Voiced

LATHRUP—Only 12 Lathrup residents showed up at the hearing on the city's budget for 1960-61. Discussion, however, was spirited on the subject of salaries, paving of roads, and refuse pickup.

A brief but heated argument between City administrator Gerald Stone and Emil Maher, Lathrup resident, regarding Stone's salary climaxed the budget discussion. In answer to Maher's statement that city administration was being paid for making building inspections and did not qualify for a raise, Richard Cogger reminded him that Stone had not requested a raise.

Cogger also read from the budget committee's recent report a declaration that Stone was not receiving sufficient pay for the efficient work he was doing and suggested that July 1 the time to air the problem. Merit increases for city personnel are reviewed at this time.

THE PROPOSED salaries for 11 city employees total \$59,898 as compared to \$7,222 currently expended. The difference represents an increase of 4.4 per cent. With the present method of using DPW men and equipment—as well as subcontracting some of the work, Stone stated the work could be done by the city at half the price. He also cited the additional benefits of retaining control, having men on call at all times, as well as eliminating contractor profit.

Mayor Cogger supported Stone's contentions and suggested that the only feasible method of improving roads to meet demands would involve a petition by interested homeowners to set up special assessment districts. This was done four years ago in the case of Lathrup boulevard.

"The money just isn't there," said the mayor and Stone.
