Once you have the equipment, test it and become completely familiar with it in water not more than shoulder deep and with a "buddy."

Always remember to inspect your equipment before you enter into the water and upon leaving the water wash all the equipment in fresh water. This is true even if you have been swimming in fresh water.

**BODY OILS** On the rubber hoses, etc., can cause a weakening in the construction, as can saliva, which is more destructive than salt water.

After you have done all these things, go ahead and enjoy the thrill of your life, down under.

## VILLAGE OF BEVERLY HILLS ORDINANCE NO. 34

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ORDINANCE NO. 4 ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR THE REGULATION AND USE OF STREETS AND HIGHWAYS; TO PROVIDE FOR THE REGULATION OF MOTOR VEHICLES AND OTHER VEHICLES; TO PROVIDE FOR PEDESTRIAN RIGHTS AND DUTIES; TO DEFINE DUTIES WHERE ACCIDENTS OCCUR; TO PROVIDE ADMINISTRATION; AND TO PROVIDE PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION OF ANY OF THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ORDINANCE."

The Village of Beverly Hills Ordains:

Section 1.01. That Section 24 h. (1) of Section 27 of Ordinance No. 4 entitled "An Ordinance to Provide for the Regulation and Use of Streets and Highways; To Provide for the Regulation of Motor Vehicles and Other Vehicles; To Provide for Pedestrian Rights and Duties; To Define Duties where Accidents Occur; To Provide Administration; And to Provide Penalties for Violation of any of the Provisions of this Ordinance" be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

"Section 24 h. (1). Whenever a vehicle is lawfully parked on a street and there is sufficient natural or artificial light to reveal any person within a distance of 500 feet upon such street, no lights need be displayed upon such parked vehicle."

Section 2.01. That Section 27 of said Ordinance No. 4 be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

"Section 27. Prohibitions for Certain Purposes.

a. No person shall park a vehicle upon any street for the principal purpose of:

- (1) Displaying such vehicle for sale;
- (2) Washing, polishing, greasing, or repairing such vehicle, except repairs necessitated by an emergency;
- (3) Displaying advertising;
- (4) Selling merchandise from such vehicle except on a duly established market place, or when so authorized or licensed under the ordinances of this municipality;
- (5) Storage for more than forty-eight continuous hours.

b. No person shall park a commercial vehicle upon any street between the hours of 8 o'clock P.M. and 4 o'clock A.M. for longer than a 30 minute period.

(1) The term "commercial vehicle" shall include all motor vehicles used for the transportation of passengers for hire or constructed or used for the transportation of goods, wares or merchandise, and/or all motor vehicles designed and used for drawing other vehicles and not so constructed as to carry any load thereon either independently or any part of the weight of a vehicle or load so drawn.

Section 3.01. This ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency ordinance which is immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety, and shall become effective immediately upon publication.

Made and passed by the Village Council of the Village of Beverly Hills this 2nd day of May, A.D. 1960.

## 12 Animals Die in 2 Fires In Southfield Importer Calls USA 'Fantastic'

SOUTHFIELD—Seven horses and five cats died in two different fires in Southfield Monday with damage totaling nearly \$7,000.

The seven horses perished and miscellaneous equipment was destroyed in a fire at 27345 11 Mile road. The owner of the animals and equipment is Robert Petke, a resident of a trailer park on Northwestern Highway.

HE AND THE fire department were summoned by Mrs. Rebecca Allen who lives in the home on the property. Both Mrs. Allen and Petke rent from the Rose Hill Realty.

Damages to the building are estimated at \$3,000, nearly \$4,000 for the horses and equipment.

THE SECOND FIRE was in a trailer at Fox trailer park, 30000 Southfield road. A female cat and four kittens died in the flames.

Total damage to the trailer, owned by James C. Shelby, was \$2,500. There was \$1,000 damage to the contents.
