Safe Driving Cuts Animal Casualties

With the coming of springtime all wild life is newly astir in woods and fields, along highways and country roads.

Now that the hibernation period over mammals are seeking breeding grounds. Bird migration to nesting sites is also in full motion. This seasonal activity spurred on by the mating instinct is necessary for the continuation of the species. As a result many kinds of wild life, particularly our game birds and smaller mammals face new dangers.

Of these the speeding automobile traveling along our super-highways presents the greatest hazard.

The conduct of animals under stress is unpredictable. How many times we have seen a fox squirrel trapped in traffic, stop and look and then turn back into the stream of automobiles!

A RECENT REPORT from the conservation department asserts that as much game is killed in traffic in Southern Michigan as is taken by hunters. In the more northern parts of our state the highway toll of deer alone has

from highway casualties.

THE LOSS of wild life goes far beyond the actual count of adults killed. Each female is a potential mother, so if you kill a hen pheasant you have also erased her prospective broods for a life span as well as the progeny of the future females in her line. With an average of 6-8 chicks per year the total loss is amazing.

The Detroit News recently reported a seven-month record kept by Harry Schneider of Joslin Lake on a daily round of 30 miles to Ann Arbor. His casualty list included 16 rabbits, 25 squirrels, 25 opossums, 16 pheasants, 12 raccoons, 9 skunks, 27 cats, 12 chickens, 4 dogs, 3 guinea hens and 1 sheep.

It is probable that in addition many other animals lay dead but out-of-sight in ditches or tall roadside weeds and grasses. Also such carnivores as foxes (too cunning to fresh meat salvaged by traffic victims) frequently

carry off and eat animals killed along the highway.

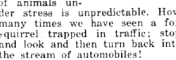

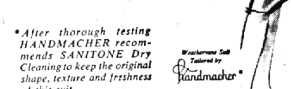

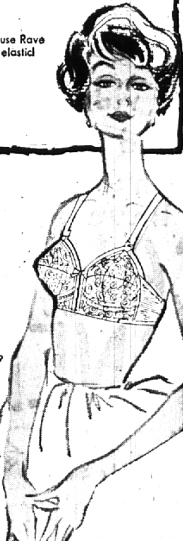
