

### G. I. Goodwins Travel to Lebanon On Kirk Mission

They left New York City direct for Beirut, where they have a special mission to perform for the Kirk of the Hills of Bloomfield Hills where the Goodwins are members.

The "Pastor's Fund" of the Rev. Harold C. DeWinds, DD, LL.D., is to be devoted to the purchase of "Cedars of Lebanon," saplings which will be sent by air cargo from Beirut to the facilities of the ministry of agriculture in Lebanon, and received at this end by the department of agriculture in New York and Detroit for proper quarantine and replanting on the grounds of Kirk of the Hills.

FIJAD NAJJAR, the minister of agriculture, whom they have seen a recent visitor in Michigan and Bloomfield Hills in particular, will assist with the project in Lebanon. The Goodwins will also visit the groves where the cedars are famous in Lebanon and visited by thousands of tourists and religious pilgrims every year.

AFTER GOING TO Egypt, including Luxor and Aswan, and a stop in Jordan to see Amman, Jerusalem, and Petra, the Goodwins will return to Lebanon to supervise the selection and planting of both cedar wood and stone for doors and other parts of the new educational building which is to be erected in the future at the Kirk of the Hills. They plan to return to Michigan later this summer.

GOODWIN is an engineer, electrical and civil, and his special projects extend over the United States. Their daughters are Mrs. Donald Dietrich and Mrs. John Quirk who also reside in Oakland County with their respective families.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Goodwin are active in the Kirk of the Hills committee and also in the various activities of the church activities concerned with insurance, and Mrs. Goodwin with the altar guild.
