## Southfield Vocalists To Sing with Chorale

**SOUTHFIELD**—On May 22 at 3 p.m., Southfield high school will host the Michigan chorale, a mixed-ensemble of 65 high school singers, including three from Southfield, from southern and central Michigan.

The group is sponsored by the Youth for Understanding Teen-Age exchange program of the Michigan council of churches. Its members have been chosen on the basis of vocal talent, scholarship and leadership ability. Each singer has been recommended by the music department of his own high school and by his pastor.

The purpose of the Michigan Chamber of Music is to provide to people of other countries through music. It is designed to develop understanding and friendship between countries, using one of the oldest arts in the world.

Since November, 1959, it has enabled talented young musicians to sing with an excellent ensemble and gain valuable training. It focuses attention on American composers and the quality of performance in our public school music programs.

**THE CHORALE**, organized in 1958, has traveled and sung for the past two summers in Europe. At the request of the United States department of state, the choir will leave by jet plane on July 1 to give concerts and programs in South America as part of the government's good-will exchange program. The singers will live with families in local communities.

## Lathrup Responds To Query

**LATHRUP**—A letter from Mayor Richard N. Cogger seeking residents' viewpoints on the controversial storm sewer problem was mailed last week. The 100 answers received by Monday indicated keen interest in a solution.

Purpose of the letter was to sample property owners' opinions. It asked if they would support a storm water program ranging from one mill, or \$7.50 for a home assessed at \$7500, up to 6.5 mills, or \$48 for a \$7500 home, as proposed and defeated at the Feb. 10 election.

Residents were asked to indicate cost reductions they favored. These included reducing the area served, increasing run-off time, and increasing depth of ditches. Also covered was the question of re-sodding ditches and re-planting driveway cuts, as well as loss of trees.

Options were also asked on a possible combined sanitary-storm sewer system, as well as a clean-out of the Evans ditch.

The mayor noted in his letter that the city government is opposing the state water resources commission's bid for the courts to order immediate construction of the required sewer systems.

**LATHRUP**—A full program of summer activities will be available to children and adults through the Lathrup recreation commission, cooperating with Southfield schools.

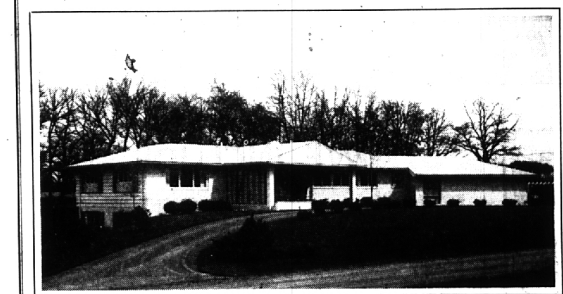
A detailed program was sent to residents last week.

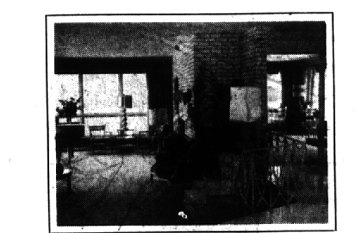
