Q. I am fifteen years old and go bowling pretty often. My feet from shoes rented at the bowling alley. How can I protect myself and still go bowling?

A. The best way is to buy your own shoes. However, when renting ice skates, roller skates, bowling shoes, etc., a bland dusting powder could be sprinkled in the shoes before using or thick socks can be worn. This affords some protection.

Notice of Last Day of Registration of the Qualified Electors of Bloomfield Hills School District No. 2, County of Oakland, Michigan

TO THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF SAID SCHOOL DISTRICT:
Please Take Notice that the Annual Election in Bloomfield Hills School District No. 2, County of Oakland, Michigan, will be held in said School District on June 13, 1960.

Section (532), Chapter 8, Part II, Act 269, Public Acts of Michigan, 1955, provides as follows:

"The inspectors of election at any annual or special election shall not receive the vote of any person residing in a registration school district whose name is not registered as an elector in the city or township in which he resides . . ."

THE LAST DAY on which persons may register with the Clerk of the City or Township in which they reside in order to be eligible to vote at said annual election to be held June 13, 1960, is Friday, June 3, 1960. Persons registering after 5:00 o'clock P.M., Eastern Standard Time, on said Friday, June 3, 1960, are not eligible to vote at said annual election.

Under the provisions of Act 269, Public Acts of Michigan, 1955, registrations will not be taken by school officials, and only persons who have registered as general electors with the Clerk of the City or Township in which they reside are registered school electors. Persons planning to register with City and Township Clerks must ascertain the days and hours on which the Clerk's office is open for registration.
