

3 Men Held In Robbery At Forest Lake

BLOOMFIELD TOWNSHIP—Three men charged with armed robbery are being held in Wayne county jail after a hold up last week at the Forest Lake country club.

Held on \$50,000 bond, the three men are also wanted in Livonia for holding up a bar.

POLICE SAID THE men, two from Chicago and one from Detroit, entered the country club through the locker room. They forced five men to line up in the room, left one hold-up man to

guard them and then went into the locker room where the manager and members were talking.

THE FIVE MEN held in the locker room were Dr. B. C. Wozniak of Pleasant Ridge, and Bloomfield township residents Russell F. Zink, of 2700 McIntosh lane, Carl L. Horner, of 615 Huyp Cross, Raymond Nelson, of 2850 Hickory Grove, and Albert E. Conner of 4444 Derry.

CLUB MANAGER John Maher and W. E. Lontz of 18840 Devonshire, Birmingham and R. H. Young of Detroit, were in the bar. Some \$1,830 cash, two rings and a watch were taken by the men.

Awaiting trial are Fran A. Garling and Nathan Consoia of Chicago and Dean Morton of Detroit.
