Services Today For Ex-Consul

The former Norwegian consul in Detroit, Carl B. Moe, 73, of 115 Colonial court, Birmingham, died Monday in Ford hospital after a short illness. He was born in Trondheim, Norway, June 22, 1887 and came to the USA in 1912.

He was vice president and general manager of the De Croupet Iron Works, Royal Oak. For 23 years he served as consul for Norway in Detroit.

Mr. Moe was twice decorated by the Norwegian government, once in February, 1923, with the Order of St. Olav, and in July, 1939, with St. Olav's Medal. They are Norway's highest honors to a civilian. Mr. Moe was the first Michigan citizen to be honored.

He was chairman of the committee which arranged the visit to Detroit of Crown Prince Olav and Princess Martha of Norway in that year.

Surviving are his wife, Sigrid Marie and a brother, Ingvald L., of New York City.

Services will be 11 a.m. today at St. Olav Evangelical Lutheran church, 15701 James Cousins. Arrangements were by the Bell Chapel of the William R. Hamilton Co.

Robert E. Allen, 22, of 1405 Holland, Birmingham, died Saturday in William Beaumont hospital from injuries sustained in an automobile accident Oct. 2. His death is Birmingham's first traffic fatality of the year.

He was injured when his car rammed the rear of a truck loaded with steel on Woodward, north of Fourteen-Mile.

Robert, the son of Bloomfield township Fire Capt. Lester P. Allen, is survived by his parents, a sister, Mrs. Blanche Danton and a brother, Robert Allen, Jr., and David.

He was assistant manager of a Birmingham service station and a member of the Eagle Lodge in Waterford.
