## Special Education Topic Of County Conference

There's a definite reason why "Johnnies-come-late" to school—and it most often indicates there is a complicated family problem, according to Otis M. Dickey, superintendent of Birmingham public schools. "They have the 'Silent Sueser' who have built walls of suspicion around themselves—again because of confusing parental situations at home," he said. But there are less of these "Johnnies" and "Suesers" in the past six years than before, because of Oakland county's forward-looking special education program, Dickey emphasized. Another important progressive step will be taken by county educators, said Dickey, when they meet Nov. 17 in Waterford with representatives of most social agencies in the county. "AT THIS day-long conference, school people, public and private social workers will try to increase their knowledge and understanding of each other's philosophies, purposes and techniques," he explained. The conference, which anticipates an attendance of more than 300, will be highlighted by a panel discussion of an actual but disguised schoolboy problem case from one of the social agencies. "FROM THIS" conference, we hope to develop future action to reduce duplication, overlapping and fill gaps between the county-wide special education program and these programs of the social and public agencies," Dickey said. Oakland county is a pioneer in Michigan with special education for children. "It is reassuring to both parents and school people to know that we in Oakland county have concern for the problems of all of our children. With continued cooperation, we look forward to the day when all of our pupils can receive maximum benefit from their school experiences," Dickey concluded.

### Print Exhibition To Open Tuesday

An exhibition of work by contemporary printmakers will open Tuesday at the Little Gallery, 915 East Maple. The lower gallery will be devoted to serigraphs and three rooms on the first floor and both stairways will contain lithographs, etchings, wood-blocks and mixed techniques. One room will be devoted to examples from 20 important printmakers. The free exhibit is open to the public from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday. The exhibition will close Dec. 3.

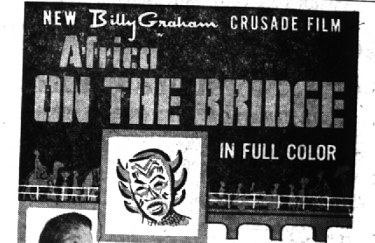

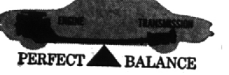

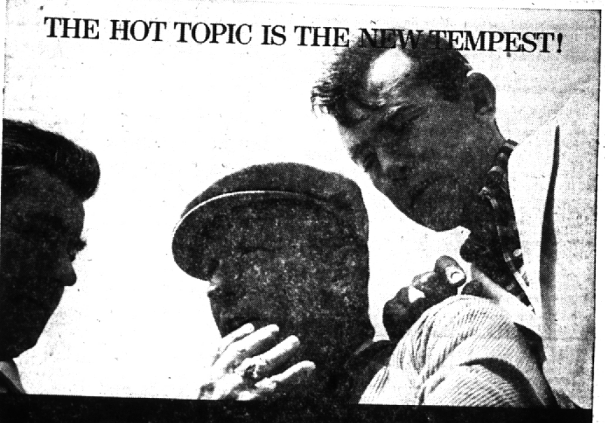
