Otis M. Smith: Democrat; 38; Flint; attended Fiat university and Syracuse university. Received law degree from Catholic University of America in 1950. Former legislative prosecuting attorney and public ad-

ministrator of Genesee county. Served on Flint election board and as a member of Genesee bar association. Running for re-election. Member of the Municipal finance commission. State employee retirement board, the Judges retirement system and Probate judges retirement board. Chairman of governor's atomic energy study committee, member of National association of state auditors, controllers and treasurers and a member of the Municipal finance officers association.

John V. Clements: Republican; Detroit; former chairman of the Baraga county Republican committee. Served on Baraga township board of review. Chairman of the Potter for senate committee in 1952. Nominated as party candidate for post of auditor general in 1958.

United States Senator

Patrick V. McNamara: Democrat; Detroit, 65, high school education plus technical apprentice training; elected United States Senator, 1954; previously, vice president of the Detroit Public Works Dept.; appointed Detroit area rent control director, World War II; member of the Michigan Civic Organization, 1946; Detroit B. P. O. Education, 1949.

Alvin M. Bentley: Republican; Owosso; University of Michigan, Honorary M.Sc. and Dr.Sc., Cleary College; Honorary LL.D., Michigan State University; Turner Diplomatic school, elected to Congress from 8th district 1952, 1954, 1956, 1958. Presently, U.S. Congressman, previously, nine years as career officer in the United States Department of State, 1942-50. State foreign service officer in Mexico City, Bogota, Colombia, Hungary and Rome.

U.S. Representative, 18th District

James Kallis: Democrat; Berkley; 42; E. M. College of Business, University of U.S. and British Intelligence schools; optional USAF; member of Michigan State Intelligence, University of Detroit; during 24 years in service was: Acting chief of Operations, CIA; planning and intelligence officer NATO; staff officer in Department of Defense.

Justice of the Supreme Court

(Non-partisan) To fill vacancy, term ending Dec. 31, 1967.

James R. Breakey, Jr.: Republican; 59; Graduate of the University of Michigan law school. Had private law practice in Ann Arbor. Appointed Washtenaw county circuit court judge in 1946. Now a member of the state supreme court.

Long court record includes marriage counseling, working with juvenile problems and conducting a school for probationers.

Theodore Souris: Detroit, 35, 1949 graduate of University of Michigan law school. Air Force veteran of World War II. Was member of a Detroit law firm from 1949 to 1951.

Became general counsel in the Detroit office of price stabilization. Named to Wayne county circuit court in 1959 to fill vacancy. In January, 1961, called to serve on supreme court until this election.
