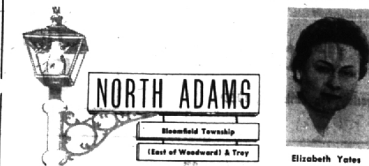
### Federated Clubs States Joint Meet

### Music Scholarship To Be Awarded

The Michigan Federation of Music clubs has established an annual \$300 scholarship to be awarded to a Michigan student who plans to enter professional work in music therapy.

The scholarship was established at the executive board meeting in August. It will be awarded for the first time during the Academic year 1960-61 and thereafter prior to the opening of school each year.

The applicant must be a Michigan resident, accepted for admission by a university with an approval course in music therapy and show definite financial need for scholarship aid. Deadline for application will be Dec. 1.
