Proceeds will be used to establish music scholarships and to provide awards of merit and transportation for students to special events, as well as for other uses determined by the school.

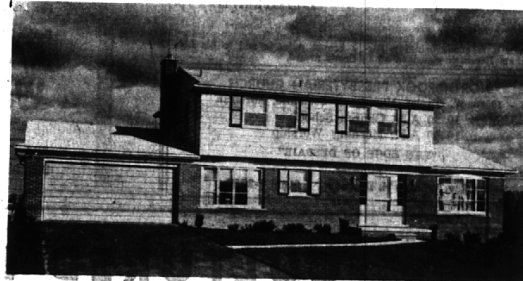

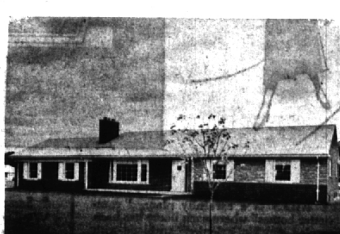

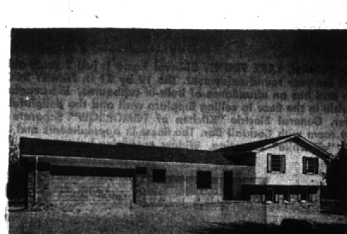
